It is a great honour and privilege to step into the role of Chair of the Association of British Philatelic Societies and I would like to begin by acknowledging the dedicated work of all those who have held this position before me, whose efforts have helped shape the ABPS into the respected organisation it is today.

As I begin my two-year tenure, I am keen to build on that strong foundation and help raise the profile of the important work that ABPS does - not only for exhibitors at national and international levels, but also within what has been the vibrant community of local societies that are the lifeblood of British philately.



Sadly, we see an increasing number of clubs having to close, as age profiles and social demographics influence stamp collecting and postal history interests with the younger generations. Of course this isn't helped by the lack of mystery of finding something new from what has become a paucity of decent affordable philatelic material for new and younger collectors and those with limited means. We see some postal agencies stopping issuing stamps at all and by necessity the world is now occupied by email junkies.

However, over the next two years, I hope to strengthen our support for societies and collectors at every level. This includes ABPS continuing to offer practical resources such as supporting facilities for club meetings at special events, as well as enhancing our developing programme of regional support for societies across the country. These initiatives are designed to foster closer collaboration, help societies grow, and ensure that philately continues to thrive in both established and hopefully new communities.

When I first started looking for a society to join (when I still had hair and a six pack), I couldn't find any information in my local library (and there were 5 societies within 10-20 mile radius!). It was the ABPS handbook, distributed free with a copy of a monthly philatelic magazine that allowed me to find a local society. Today, some 45 years on, of course I use the internet. To that end another target I hope to set up is the opportunity for each society, who so chooses, to have their own website at very little or indeed no charge. Websites are so helpful as an advertising and marketing platform and they are the 'go to' way younger generations seek information. I believe that the more we share our interest on such platforms the more budding collectors will potentially join in and help strengthen the philatelic community we all enjoy.

I look forward to working alongside all of you - collectors, exhibitors, and society members alike - to champion our shared passion for philately. Together, I believe we can continue to celebrate, promote, and preserve this remarkable hobby for generations to come.

Editorial

What an exhausting time I had at EuroPhilEx. I was there for a whole week trying to make myself useful. As can be expected at such an event, there was much to do and not always enough time or people to do it. We need to remember what went well so that we can repeat it, and what didn't so that we can find ways of improving on that. Something like that can never be perfect but Birmingham NEC seems to have



satisfied many people. I certainly enjoyed meeting old friends and making new ones. If you didn't come and lived within 50 miles, shame on you - I hope to see you at the next one.

I was able to talk to a few people for whom this was their first visit to a Stamp etc. Exhibition. The British Guiana stamp was naturally a topic of conversation and I was quizzed on its history, value and then appearance. I ended up talking to about half-a-dozen people, ages from 12 to unknown, about that stamp, Penny Blacks, Covers, and so on. The usual question is "What should I collect?" My answer is always "What you like - nothing else matters in the early stages. Then you can aim your collection(s) in certain directions." We then moved on to look at some of the displays - Postal History evoked the response "But this is fantastic history", Postcards were "just fascinating - did they really send these through the post 100 years ago?", Thematic and Open "Wow - this is great." and Traditional evoked discussion on designs, production and so on. I ended up exhausted but exhilarated - Philately is still alive and kicking, but remember that we started with stamp collecting and enjoyment not Gold Medals.

Whilst writing this I am mentally preparing for York - another good time - only two days this time, but preceded by a Regional Royal/Postal History Society meeting. I also hear of other successful events having taken place or being prepared around the country. Please support them if you can. Officials and helpers put a lot of effort into them and deserve your support. I hear sometimes of people complaining that not much is available, but it is if you look for these fairs and exhibitions and take the trouble to go to them. We cannot expect them to continue if the support falls away.

Of course, all of these events, federations and societies need helpers of various sorts. We continue to hear of societies closing for three reasons: Lack of members, lack of money and lack of officers/helpers. The first needs careful thought - see David Smith's 100 Steps on the ABPS website. The second is a problem that can only be solved by sensible subscription levels, fund-raising or sponsorship - but remember the ABPS Small Grants Scheme. The third is down to us all - don't put too much on the same people for too long and then complain when they decide to stop.

Off my soapbox now and back to collecting.

Obituaries

Alan Huggins RDP (1936-2025)

With deep regret we heard of the death of Dr Alan Keith Huggins RDP (1936-2025) on 27th May. Alan supported philately with many contributions at all levels. He was instrumental in promoting the idea of a federation of all the European National Associations in order to promote cooperation and mutual support, and became the founder President of FEPA from 1989. He was the Chairman of the FIP Postal Stationery Commission, a subject which was dear to his heart. His research and scholarship were recognised and celebrated by philatelists across the globe. For all of his work,



knowledge, research and experience he was invited to sign the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists. Alan has also been the President of the Royal Philatelic Society of London and the Great Britain Philatelic Society as well as supporting many societies by giving displays of the highest calibre.

Rod Unwin

The West Riding Stamp Club 2025 is saddened to report that Rod Unwin died during the night 28th/29th April 2025 and his funeral took place on Friday 23rd May 2025 at Park Wood Crematorium, Park Road, Elland HX5 9HZ.

Rod was a Fellow of The Royal Philatelic Society of London and a member of their Expert Committee for which he expertised stamps and postal history of Syria and Palestine. He was also a member of the Oriental Philatelic Association of London, which covered the Ottoman Empire. OPAL closed in 2023. He was a Fellow of the Society of Postal Historians, a member of Huddersfield Philatelic Society, West Riding Stamp Club and Halifax Philatelic Society from 1979 where he was the librarian, YPA Delegate and later the archivist. He was president three times over the years. Halifax closed in February 2025.

Rod gave Stamp and Postal History displays to many societies throughout Yorkshire, Lancashire, Cheshire and the Midlands. He also entered philatelic competitions at local level and was awarded many trophies for his entries. He obtained a Gold Medal for his entry in a National Exhibition and following this with a Vermeil Medal in a later International Exhibition. He also had articles published in philatelic publications and was co-author of the book "*The Philatelic History of the Arab Kingdom of Syria*" with Alexander Kaczmarczyk of Paris – first edition 2002 plus a revised 2nd edition published later.

Rachel McHugh (1932-2025)

Harrogate Philatelic Society is sad to report that we have lost a stalwart member of the society. She died just one day short of her 93rd birthday after a steady deterioration in her health. Rachel had held many posts in the society, including president on a few occasions during her 50+ years of membership of the society. She had also acted as the society representative to the YPA over many years. Rachel was a lover of the sea-collecting lighthouses, sailing ships and steamers



- all on stamps, of course. She was very willing to show them to other societies until travel become a problem. She was very proud to have received the ABPS Award of Merit

North Kent has bid a sad Farewell to two members recently: **Eileen Elton**, a long-time and stalwart member of the Sidcup Society and **John Corderoy**: a long-term member of the National where he displayed, a frequent and well-regarded speaker, invited to present displays covering regions like Gibraltar involving postal stationery and postal history. He was engaged at the club level, entertaining, encouraging and educating fellow collectors. *John Sinfield*

Two further obituaries are not of people but of societies. Both have closed due to falling numbers, increased ages making going out to meetings less inviting and resultant financial problems.

Keswick Philatelic Society had fallen to around six members and decided to close the albums. Some of its members will be considering visiting Cockermouth PS, where I am sure that they will receive a great welcome.

At the other end of the country **Truro Philatelic Society** has closed in its 60th year for the same reasons. Once one of the largest societies in the South West of England, Covid and falling numbers since have led to its closure.

For those who cannot travel I hope that they will consider joining other more distant societies in their Zoom programme. I know that my own society, Harrogate, will welcome them - see our website via the ABPS website for details.

Smithsonian Philatelic Achievement Award Recipients in November 2025 include:

Chris King

Christopher M B King RDP FRPSL, United Kingdom (born 1948), is a prolific collector, researcher and exhibitor specializing in the philately of Denmark, the Duchy of Schleswig, Lübeck and Napoleonic Europe as well as illustrated, propaganda and censored mail. His exhibits have won numerous international gold and large gold medals, especially "Schleswig, From Danish Duchy to Prussian Province: Early Mail to 1867." He frequently contributes articles to publications such as *Scandinavian Contact*, *Posthorn. London Philatelist* and *Collectors Club*



Philatelist. He is an internationally accredited juror for postal history. Chris joined the Royal Philatelic Society London (RPSL) in 2005 and advanced quickly through its ranks. He became a member of council in 2007, was elected a fellow in 2008 and served as a vice president from 2009–2012. As president from 2013–2015, he focused on positioning the society's library, building and membership for the future. He led the effort to find a new home for the RPSL, completed in 2019.

His record of service to international philately includes Keeper of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists (2009–2015), chairman of the British Philatelic Trust (2010–2015), executive board member of the Association of British Philatelic Societies (2009–2012) and board member of the Club de Monte-Carlo de l'Elite de la Philatélie (2016–2024).

He was elected a *membre associé* of the Académie de Philatélie (France) in 2013 and invited to sign the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists in 2014. He received the RPSL's Bacon Medal and was named an Honorary Fellow in 2018. He received the award of the European Parliament of L'Académie Européenne de Philatélie in 2018 and the Collectors Club of New York's Alfred F Lichtenstein Memorial Award for Distinguished Service to Philately in 2019.

The Smithsonian Philatelic Achievement Award (SPAA) was established in 2002 to honour and celebrate living individuals for outstanding lifetime achievement in the field of philately. This achievement may include original research that significantly advances the understanding of philately, exceptional service to the philatelic community or sustained promotion of philately to the benefit of current and future collectors.



Forces Postal History & Postcards. First World War Royal Naval Seaplane Station. Hill of Oaks. Windermere 1916-17.

This bereavement cover with no visible date sent possibly from Manchester (just the first two and a half letters of the postmark location being visible) is addressed to Aircraftsman R Fuller who was based at the Royal Navy Seaplane Station, Hill of Oaks, Windermere. Mail to and from this small Seaplane Station which existed for just over a year could be considered as scarce.





Flying from Hill of Oaks, Lake Windermere dates back to 1911 with the "Lakes Water Bird" Floatplane making the first of many successful flights until it was destroyed with its hanger in a freak storm in March 1912 at Cockshott. Waterbird 'had the distinction of being the first successful British hydroaeroplane.

The Lakes Aviation Company was taken over in November 1914 by the Northern Aircraft Company which had been training pilots and was recognised by the Military. In May 1916 the RNAS decided to fully take over and Windermere became known as RNAS Windermere or RNAS Hill of Oaks. However, financial difficulties

encountered by the civil company later that year forced military instruction and the base itself to cease by the end of June 1917. The aircraft flown at Hill of Oaks during its service as a Royal Navy Seaplane Station were Short 827 Seaplane (3), Nieuport MH Seaplane (4) and FBA Type A Flying Boat.

Basildon

In April Maggie Thompson Entertained: with *Triangles*. Liberia came in for close scrutiny, including complete sheets, proofs and essays. Usage on covers was not neglected. Then came her revenue stamps and markings of the Saar valley region, beginning with a document of 1877, and ending in the 1960s. Each German region had its own revenue stamps. The chequered history of the area meant that she included the alternating influences of French and German authorities. In May Mick Carter showed us British Forces in Egypt 1932 to 1951. The British military presence in Egypt lasted until after World War Two. British services personnel were given concessionary postal rates by the Egyptian Post Office in 1932, for which the Navy, Army and Air Force Institution (NAAFI) issued postal seals that had to be applied to the backs of envelopes. For airmail or other premium services, additional Egyptian postage stamps were required. A few postcards were used to "lighten" the display. He also showed us WWII, with censorship and the presence of other Allied troops. In June Charlie Mead entertained us with four very educational films, covering the work of Jean de Sperati, the master forger of early issues; the "CANCELLED" postmark on certain Pitney Bowes remainders; a documentary showing how mail was got to Royal Navy ships at sea, and then **Bill Barrell** on how to float off and "improve" Penny Blacks and Reds and Twopenny Blues. Ceylon was under British colonial rule from 1815. Native sovereignty as a Dominion of the British Empire was granted after WWII in 1948. In 1972 Ceylon became a Republic and was renamed Sri Lanka. In 1862 de la Rue printed the first revenue stamps. These were the brown (with varying shades) 1d and 2d vertical and rectangular issues showing Queen Victoria's head facing to the right. If you look at early Victorian stamps her head faces left. These

were used on Exchange Bills. In any monetary transaction there were three parties involved: payee A, payee B and the 'drawer'. Three stamps were used on Exchange Bills. With Queen Victoria's death in 1901, King Edward VII's left-facing side portrait appeared on stamps as is considered normal practice. Peter's display was a wonderful array of fiscal stamps including master die proofs, blocks of three, singles and stamps on Exchange Bills. There were Foreign Bills, Provisionals, Judicials, Telegraph stamps, and Stamp Duty: Over 120 sheets of philatelic study. He was an extremely enthusiastic speaker who obviously loves and enjoys his study. Our thanks to **John Bushell** for an

In May the first laydown was a presentation by **Jill Fearons** on *Submarines and Maritime Postal History*. This began with the early submarines, through WWII and up to the modern-day, including many postcards which

helpfully illustrated the different types of submarine. She finished with a broader maritime history from local waters, especially from the time around WWII. Glenn Fearons presented the second laydown on the 1936 Johannesburg International Philatelic Exhibition (JIPEX), held in South Africa. This included a selection of postcards, panes of stamps and covers, together with some memorabilia from the exhibition. North West Kent

On 8th April **Robert Mott** showed *Third Reich Private Postal Stationery*. Alongside official state-issued items, many privately produced cards and envelopes, authorized by the Reichspost and bearing pre-printed stamps were sold, often with special designs or advertising. In June 1942 the Reichspost ordered that such stationery could no longer be sold to collectors or dealers, only those commissioned for genuine postal use. This was driven by wartime shortages, the desire to keep propaganda in circulation rather than in collections, tighter control over distribution, and the regime's general disapproval of non-essential hobbies during total war. A fortnight later, **Phil Clarke** showed us *British Postal History* from the 18th Century onwards, preprinted / embossed letter sheets through the 1d post onto the embossed Wilding & Machin with the increasing rates. In May **Paul Davey** brought *Aspects of China* a story of postal activity from 12th Century Government couriers through European Ports occupations, the Japanese occupation to the post-war struggles and **Brian Stonestreet** *New Zealand a New Era*; a comprehensive look at the 1915

1st series issues and the various printings of 1935-42 series. In June **Janet** & **Nick Nelson** took us to *Puerto Rico & Ifni*, two small but interesting states with a rich history. In July **Ray Barton** showed his display of *GB speeding up the mail* 1854-7 a short but fascinating episode in British postal history. *John Sinfield*

Northwich

An Alpine journey along Swiss Railways: We were delighted to welcome back a former speaker, Norton Wragg, to give us another display - this time on Swiss Railways. The display started with a range of early material, including covers and postcards with the names of the locations on postmarks, which continued until 1880 after which the routes were numbered instead. The first lines started in 1847 and were all smaller railways, on which there were two rates for inland post, (local up to 10km), and national. Shortly after, town names were added to postal stationery to allow for accurate accounting of the revenues that were being charged and distributed from this postal service. By 1880 circular date stamp cancels arrived bearing route numbers and Norton was able to show us a range of these. The main focus of the display was on mail using the Swiss system en route to somewhere in Switzerland, but there were also a number of covers going from Switzerland to other parts of Europe. Overall the display was a great opportunity to show the distribution of mail within Switzerland and around Jonathan Guy Europe in the late 1880s.

Rochdale

Our June meeting was the annual cup competition for the best presentation on the night by participating members. **Pete Guest** talked about *P & O Ships that Called at Malta* during WWI and WWII. He displayed sheets depicting the ocean liners together with letters transported between Malta and other ports. **Jack Lindley** presented *New Zealand late 19th Century Pictorial Stamps* where the designs were chosen from public competitions. He highlighted significant errors that occurred on these issues. **David Hudson** explained *The History of UK Registered Postal Services* from its inception in 1878. Payment scales reflected charge rates according to the value of contents. Samples of registered letters were displayed. One of these was from 1918 when women were first allowed to vote. This registered letter informed the lady in question that she had been selected for jury service which is compulsory for voters. **Thomas Barlow** won our competition cup with his presentation of *Stamps from Malaysia*. The country is rich in philatelic interest, due to the changing politics across many Malaysian states. New members are always welcome at our meetings,



The keynote speaker at this year's seminar was Alan Moorcroft FRPSL of East Anglia Postal History Society and Frinton, who explained What is Postal History? In an excellent PowerPoint presentation, he was clear in differentiating between collecting postal history and competing in that category. In competing, there are strict rules about what you can include and what you should demonstrate. In collecting, you can collect what you want, how you want. The important part is to use the material to show the story behind the mail, e.g. the Flemish weavers of Colchester and the Corsini Brothers, Marconi's experiments at Frinton, or the Polish Post Office in the Essex countryside. He thus demonstrated how collecting postal history could lead to all sorts of discoveries and take you to places that you would not otherwise know about, and could be used to further develop other personal interests. The importance of understanding postal markings, rates and routes was demonstrated, showing how, historically, the posting cost between two points could vary according to the route to be taken, in both national and international mail. Later, Alan displayed the actual items that had been illustrated in the presentation. It was then the turn of those members present to display anything that they may have brought. Twelve members availed themselves of this opportunity, namely Len Stanway, Geoff Miller, Mick Carter, Mark Edwards, Bob Hider, Nick Harris, Mike Burt, Andy Howson, Maggie Thompson, John Copeland, Leslie Peters, Ray How.

Cyprus SC

At the recent Zoom meeting of the society members were shown a Powerpoint presentation of the GB stamps overprinted CYPRUS. This was followed by a look at Study Paper 19 (part of the Cyprus Study Circle Philatelic Compendium all held on a Memory Stick) that gives vast amounts of detail about these stamps and the many flaws that are known. It includes the extensive information we have about these stamps, all fully illustrated, including plate numbers' positions on each plate where flaws occur plus the various overprints carried out locally that introduce even more flaws due to positioning errors. We entered our Memory Stick into Europhilex2025 at v3.0 - we actually supplied v3.4. We were horrified when the catalogue of Literature exhibits stated Cyprus Study Circle Memory Stick v1.0 and horror of horrors the results were that v1.0 gained a Large Vermeil exactly what it got at the Previous International. Two questions arise why was it mis-described and did the Judges actually look at what had been submitted?

Czechoslovak PS of GB

'Gobsmacked!' was the reaction of one of our members to the online presentation of *First Republic* by **Pavol Lazar**. Twenty-seven members were treated to a rare display – in every sense of the word! – of classic Czechoslovak philately, on 9th April. After summarizing the programme of stamp design, printing techniques, and policy decisions that accompanied the development of the new republic's postal strategy, Pavol illustrated his presentation with a fabulous collection of stamps, many of which are amongst the rarest items in

Czechoslovak philately. These included a block of 40 Austrian 12 heller Imperial Crown 'POŠTA ČESKOSLOVENSKÁ' overprints, and an extremely rare airmail overprint on a violet Austrian 10K Arms. Overprints on Hungarian stamps included a Mercury 5 heller in a strip with four tabs and a section of the margin. There was also a unique cover carrying thirteen overprinted 5 heller Austrian postage due stamps, in a mixed franking with a 10 haler red Hradčany. The Hradčany stamps included a central cross of the 20 haler, taken from the place where each of the four printing plates on the forme came together, and vertical gutter pairs with Hradčany printed alongside newspaper stamps. The Chainbreaker design followed – for the 50 haler value Pavol showed examples of

gutter pairs, blocks including the 'egg' and 'missing head' varieties, and the legendary '50 DOPLATIT' overprint on 50 haler error. Following a moment's astonished silence, members expressed their enormous thanks for sharing such a wonderful collection with them.

There were 24 Youth entries divided into age classes of 12 and under, 13-14 and 15-17. As well as entries from individuals, stamp clubs from three schools took up the




