

NOTES FROM THE CHAIR:

This is the last "Notes from the Chair" I will be writing. At the next AGM, to be held during the Philatelic Congress of Great Britain, on Saturday 13th July, I will be standing down after three years as Chair of ABPS. Having just written those two sentences the first thought that comes in to my mind is "so what have you achieved in the three years?" Looking back at the first "Notes from the Chair" I wrote in September 2021, I see that one of my principle objectives whilst Chair was to raise the profile of ABPS. Reflecting on this I think that the Executive



Committee have gone some way to raising the profile of the organisation – but there is still a long way to go. The other thought I have is about the state of philately three years on. There have been many local societies closing, specialist societies closing and mergers here and there. However, I do think that philately is still strong and will survive. New collecting areas are being developed. New ways of collecting are being adopted. If innovation continues, I think there is a good future for philately.

But let's look at what has been happening recently: At the end of March, we had the LONDON SPRING EXHIBITION 2024. This was a national exhibition of 165 display frames organised by the ABPS Exhibitions Committee and held at the premises of The Royal Philatelic Society London. The event was particularly aimed at those collectors interested in competitive philately who were seeking to qualify for forthcoming international competitions. From what I saw at the event and comments I've heard, it seems to have been a great success with all the frames being taken and the standard of exhibits very high. To see the individual results of the event go to the ABPS website at www.abps.org.uk A similar event is already in the planning for next year. The York event will be taking place 19th and 20th July where competitive displays will again be on show.

Looking at what else is happening in 2024, one of the stand-out events of the year is the **Philatelic Congress of Great Britain** in Southampton from 11th to 14th July. It will be based at the Leonardo Grand Harbour Hotel, close to the harbour and city centre. The programme will have as its theme **New Directions in Philately** with contributors from around the world exploring this area. We can share the latest developments and best practices in philately. This is an event for <u>everyone</u> with an interest in philately with displays by local collectors as well as leading overseas collectors. The Role of Distinguished Philatelists will be joining Congress this year to make it a very special event! Full details about Congress can be found on the ABPS website.

Earlier in these notes I mentioned the aim of improving the profile of ABPS. In my last "Notes" I said that the ABPS needed someone new to take on the role of Director of Communications – to lead and manage all aspects of communications from the ABPS to societies, federations and external

audiences. We still need someone to volunteer to take on this post. It is a key role in ensuring that the ABPS serves as a central hub for information exchange, keeping all members informed about the latest developments in the world of philately. The ABPS, and philately in general, to be able to exist, flourish and develop, needs "DOERS" – people who will actually do things to support philately. As we move forward, I do hope that "DOERS" can be found.

Editorial

Just in case no one else thinks of doing it publicly I want to thank Steve for all his efforts to make organised philately work in Great Britain. I gain great enjoyment from investigating each cover. I am sure that others do so as well. Some want to enter competitions - developing the story of what they have found and its relationship with their own theme but working to the rules. Others prefer to write up pages in the same way but without the rules so that they can show it without fear of criticism - they form the bulk of the displayers to their own or other societies - don't forget to add the details to the ABPS Speakers' List and/or to send them to your own federation. My great joy is building long or short Zoom displays on a variety of themes - I learn much from the research and sometimes even more from the people who come to the displays from all over the world. Some work on their collections in isolation. I think that they are missing out but their enjoyment of their own collection is the important thing. If you have ideas of the way that philately in Great Britain should develop please don't keep them to yourselves but don't expect that they will be able to be effected rapidly. For example new ideas about federations have been put forward - combine them into three or four large ones. However federation officers have told us of the difficulty of getting responses from their current societies. Would bigger federations be easier? Ideas can't be turned into action without work and thought from a number of people. Yes - we need doers but we do need thinkers too. Keith Burton

Newcastle Upon Tyne Philatelic Society – 80

Although we are pleased to celebrate our 80th Anniversary, our history can be traced to the North of England Philatelic Society (NEPS) which held its first meeting in Newcastle on 7th March 1904; the display on that occasion included *Reconstructed Plates of the Penny Red*.

Gradually, from 1924, other local societies were organised as sections of the NEPS, which in time changed its name to the North of England Philatelic Association (NEPA). By 1944 Newcastle was the only place without a society. This was remedied on 4th March 1944, when 26 gentlemen who were present at the Inaugural Meeting voted unanimously on the motion 'That the Newcastle upon Tyne Philatelic Society be formed'. The gentlemen must have been

confident regarding the conclusion of WWII and followed the wartime approach of 'Staying Calm and Carry on Collecting Postage Stamps'.

The first ordinary meeting was held on 7th September 1944 when the display was given by **Mr Frank Goddard**, who showed some of the famous *JR Seymour's collection of Great Britain*, along with other selections from other famous collections.

We have had numerous meeting venues over the years, starting with the Liberal Club in 1944 and now meeting in the historic Literary and Philosophical Society



building on Westgate Road. To celebrate the milestone 15 members and guests met for lunch in a restaurant on Grey Street. We spent two enjoyable hours, as the photograph has captured so well. Of note, among

membership present was **Terry Pickering**, a member who has clocked up an amazing 64 years continuous membership with the society – man and boy a philatelist!

Sadly, membership numbers have declined from 63 who celebrated our Jubilee Year (2004), to 25 today. But we are still able to attract one or two new members, so there is some hope for the future. We offer a warm welcome to new members - either returning or new to the district.

John N Hammonds FRPSL

I am very sorry to report that John Hammonds died on 17th January. He received the Congress Medal in 2004 and continued to work tirelessly for British philately and for this additional contribution he received an Award of Merit in 2020.

He was the auctioneer for the Association of Sussex Philatelic Societies, taking over in 1986 until 1998. In 2003 he took the role of editor of that federation's journal and remained in that position for 16 years. During his editorship he produced a journal the federation could be proud of.

While acting as auctioneer for the federation, John was also auctioneer for France & Colonies Philatelic Society from 1977 to 1992, becoming Vice President in 1991 and President in 1993 until 1996. For some 25 years John was a staunch supporter of the society and heavily involved with much of the work required to run a successful society.

In addition, he was an officer in the British Airmail Society, and for many years, prepared the index for the Stamp Lover, the journal of the National Philatelic Society.

Apart from his France and Colonies collection, John had an interest in Bohemia and Moravia and wrote a book under the title *Bohemia & Moravia: A Collectors' Notebook* for the Czechoslovak Philatelic Society of Great Britain of which he was a member.

John Hammonds was an Honorary Vice-President of ABPS.

He will be much missed and we send our condolences to his widow, Jean.



John Frederick Came 1933-2024

Members of the Chelmsford and District Philatelic Society were saddened to hear of John's death in hospital after a short illness, aged 90, having attended the last meeting before our winter break on 12th December, when he appeared to be in fine fettle.

John was a life-long Essex resident, living his early years in the village of Danbury, before moving to Maldon in his later years. He joined our society on 8th November 1948, whilst still attending King Edward VI Grammar School. In school holidays and weekends John helped in his village post office including distributing telegrams on his bicycle.

John was an architect by profession and I had the pleasure of working with him for a number of years at County Hall for Essex County Council. He worked on a number of prestigious projects in County Hall, mindful of Councillors' and Chief Officers' requirements, and this attention to detail was also evident as far as his collection of stamps was concerned.



He was a life member of our society and was president from 2008 as well as packet secretary since 1978.

Until recent years, John attended National Philatelic Society meetings in London with fellow members of our society. He enjoyed the visits as it usually included having a meal afterwards.

His funeral took place on 15th March at Chelmsford Crematorium, followed by a wake at the Swan in Maldon. He will be sadly missed by us all. *David J Everard*

About The Author ► Andrew found his Father's stamps at the age of 10. A year later at Senior School he immediately joined the School Stamp Club. He 'specialised'(I) in British, but soon was interested in Queen Victoria which he could not afford. The 2nd to last boy wearing short trousers in his school year, he religiously bought Post Office New Issues on Tuesdays with his pocket money. He soon found that he enjoyed swapping / trading stamps as much as collecting them. Aged 19, eschewing University he quickly found a philatelic career in London, leading to creating his own companies in stamps. Andrew has authored many internationally published Stamp 'Tips' articles, appearing on Local Radio and National TV promoting Philately with Alan Titchmarsh. Andrew's area of expertise is unusual - in so far as his grounding in collecting and wide philatelic knowledge has given him a deep understanding of Philately. He has studied Philately for the past 51 years, in combination with Commerce and Marketing Expertise, enabling him to create synergies in 'lifetime' interlinked Stamp Selling Systems, selling unit-priced stamps through to handling collections & Rarities up to £700,000 each. Today Andrew is fortunate to be co-owner with his Wife, of Universal Philatelic Auctions (aka UPA) - the Largest No Buyer's Premium Reducing-Estimate System Stamp Auction in the World, creating records selling stamps to 2.261 different bidders

from 54 different countries in his international auctions.
Andrew stopped collecting stamps aged 18 reasoning that his enjoyment of stamps would be in handling them and solling them... ...but did it really? What was the real reason? How could a Dealer pay a higher price than a Collector? It doesn't make sense, does it? Collectors are customers. Customers usually pay the highest price, unless... for a Collector, this was...

Wrong Presentation Wrong Place X
therefore Wrong Price X

3 Fast-forward 48 years later to a British Empire collection, lot #1 in an International Stamp Auction – Estimated at £3,000, but we were the highest bidder at £21,000 – YES – some 7×higher. Including Buyer's Premium in the extraordinary sum of £4,788 we actually paid GBP£25,788= upon a £3,000 estimate... however, we broke it down into sets, singles, minicollections etc. We made a profit. Some might say it found its price. Others may say:

Wrong Estimate X Wrong Presentation X
Wrong StructureX Wrong Protection of Price X

– Lucky for the seller that 2 well-heeled bidders saw the potential value that day or it could have been given away... the seller could easily have lost out couldn't he? or she?

So, by un-peeling the layers of obfuscation, hopefully we can all agree:

The Secret is Simple –
it's ALL ABOUT : TIMING
Plus the 3 Philatelic 'P's –

Presentation Place V and Price V

4 Understanding the problem... always remember the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide. I've no idea, I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing - BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last 'bastion' in this on-line transparent world that we inhabit... whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there...

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and auctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied — "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – because my answer would have been entirely different (and I don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy more collector clients than any other stamp auction

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of turnover – up to £200,000 per annum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell £200K per annum).

5 Why is that? Because, as the world revolved the Stamp Market, imperceptibly Changed, and incrementally -Massively

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock – but absent collectors in

the place they choose to sell their stamps in. Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Customer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our former competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. In my most recent 20,000+ lot UPA 77th Auction we had 1,793 different bidders from 49 different countries, 95% of whom were Collectors. Some other well-advertised auctions only have 200 bidders (a high percentage of whom are dealers - so that, essentially they are Dealer-dominated auctions) - so that when you sell through them - you're paying up to 18% (including VAT) seller's commission and the buyer is paying up to 25% and more in Buyer's Premium, credit card fees, on-line bidding fee, delivery and insurance etc... AND all of that so that your stamps may be sold, wait for it - TO DEALERS (and some collectors), but Dealers, that naturally must make a profit to survive...

Now, let's examine the cost implications - Example: Your stamp collection sells in public auction for £800. Upon a 25% buyer's premium, the dealer pays £1,000 and it could be more. He breaks it into £2,000+ selling price (much lower and he'll go out of business). The auction charges you a seller's commission of up to 18% (VAT included) upon the £800 sale price. This is GBP£144. Therefore you receive approaching £656 - which is approximately 33% of the dealer's £2,000+/- retail selling price - BUT... now that we have identified the problem...

> Isn't the Solution Staring us Right in The Face ?

Why Pay an Auction to Sell to Dealers: Sell to Collectors instead? In our example with buyer's premium, sellers commission, lotting fees, extra credit card charges, VAT and even insurance - you're already being charged in different ways up to 40% of the selling price to sell, possibly or probably, to the wrong person.

obvious so that money may be taken, almost surreptitiously, in numerous different ways, (without us apparently noticing until we see the cheque in our pocket) - the transparent 'seller pays' has been deliberately 'obscured' - so much so that, amazingly, the latest 2017 European Auction Selling Legislation just introduced - now requires auctions that charge 'buyer's premiums' to warn the buyer in advance. Just imagine going into the petrol station, and being warned that the price you're paying to put fuel in you tank is not the real price, you have to pay a premium! Obviously, there would be an uproar...

9 How can you cut out the middleman and sell Collectors instead? Well, I can think of two ways. 1). DIY - Do It Yourself selling on eBay. That may be fine for lower grade material - but, would you risk auctioning relatively unprotected rare material on eBay ? We don't and we're professionals, so we should know what we're doing. Or 2). Cut out the extra middle-man. Use my company UPA, which reaches collectors instead. Here's how it works: Continuing from our previous Example:

The auction sold your stamps to a dealer for £1,000 - but You received circa £656

UPA sells them to collectors for you for up to £2,000 – even after 40% commission you receive up to £1,200. Up to £544 more. Now that's amazing, isn't it?

How Strong is the Stamp and Cover Market? Everybody knows that the strongest areas are GB and British Empire. Post-Independence / QEII material sells but if hinged at considerable discount. Mint hinged material pre 1952 is regarded as the industry 'norm' and therefore desirable - but genuine never-hinged commands a premium. Europe sells but at reduced levels, Americas is good, as generally is Asia but the 'heat' has come off China which is still good - and Russia which can still be good. East Europe is weaker. Overall, Rarities throughout can command their own price levels and real Postal History has good demand.

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
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Bill Hedley - Congress Medallist

The ABPS has awarded the Congress Medal 2024 to Bill Hedley, FRPSL.

He has made and continues to make contributions to organised philately at all levels. He was elected President of the Federation of European Philatelic Associations in 2019, having previously served as a UK delegate and in 2023 he was re-elected for a second term of office. Having recognised a gap in the international philatelic calendar, he served as Chairman of the Organising Committee of EuroPhilex 2015. Under his chairmanship the show set out to differ from previous international exhibitions by attracting many more overseas dealers and



Bill is a qualified Postal History Judge both at national and international level and has acted as a UK Commissioner with responsibilities for ensuring the safe delivery and return of exhibitors' material sent to overseas exhibitions. He has served on the Executive Committee of ABPS and as a director of that company. He held the position of Chairman of the Exhibitions and International Committee together with directorships of ABPS Exhibitions Ltd and Stamp World Exhibitions.

Of considerable benefit was his successful negotiation of an ongoing three-year arrangement with the National Imports Reliefs Unit of HM Revenue and Customs to obtain Duty Relief exempting from taxation the import and export of philatelic exhibits.

As a fellow of the Royal Philatelic Society London, he had responsibilities, for many years, as Curator of the Museum and Archives, and subsequently he was appointed Honorary Secretary serving on both Council and the Management Committee.

Bill holds the office of Honorary Treasurer of the Cinderella Stamp Club. He was auctioneer of the Hungarian Philatelic Society of Great Britain for many years and is a Past President of that Society. He is also an active member of the Austrian Philatelic Society, the Revenue Society and the Society of Postal Historians.

He is a Past President of the Kent Federation. As a Past President of the Royal Tunbridge Wells Philatelic Society his guidance is always available to the current committee.

Bill Hedley was nominated by the Society for Postal Historians and the Royal Philatelic Society London. He is a worthy recipient of the Congress Medal for 2024.

The Roll of Distinguished Philatelists

New Signatories for 2024 and details of the signing ceremony

An open invitation to all to attend in person or by Zoom on Friday 12th July. At the meeting of the Board of Election of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists on 7th March 2024 it was unanimously agreed that the following philatelists be invited to be the new signatories to the Roll:

Walter Britz RDP (Uruguay) Yu-An Chen RDP (Chinese Taipei)
John Davies RDP (United Kingdom) Bernard Jimenez RDP (France)
Ivar Sundsbø RDP (Norway) Patricia Kaufmann RDP (USA) (2023)

The invitation to sign the Roll is the highest and most prestigious of honours in philately, and is the world's oldest philatelic honour, recognising achievement, research, publication and service in many areas of philately. The Roll was instituted in Harrogate in May 1921 and the signature of His Majesty King George V appears at its head as the first signatory. The total number of signatories up to and including those selected in 2024 (but excluding HM King George V) is 412 from 42 different countries. In its design, the Roll contains the names of 46 so-called "Fathers of Philately", names of great philatelists who would have been invited to sign had they been alive at the time. At the first ceremony in Harrogate the signatures of the initial 39 names were added to the Roll.

Decline in Membership of Local Societies

There was general agreement that there was a decline and an acceptance that further decline was inevitable as philately as a hobby continues to decline. But there was a general willingness to try to do something to avert this. Below is a discussion on some of the points.

RECRUITMENT

Target Audience

- 2. The normal marketing policy is to identify your target audience and put all your marketing to that audience. It is the view that there is no target audience to whom we could appeal. We had to appeal to all audiences:
- a. **Young People.** The traditional audience was no longer there and had been lost for a variety of reasons:

The internet and TV provide the interest in countries, animals etc that many of us experienced in our youth through stamps. Phones enable children to spend much more time with friends and means less spare time.

Schools no longer have stamp clubs. Teachers have no interest in setting up after-school clubs. How many of us can name schools which have an active stamp club? – there are 24 413 schools in England. Many of us were members of school clubs in our youth.

Youngsters' attention operates quickly and changes fast. Philately does neither.

Collecting Stamps is no longer fashionable and/or cool. Children do enthusiastically collect things such as Pokémon cards, cards of footballers etc but only briefly and during the period in their lives when it is cool.

Parents, who in the majority of cases don't collect stamps, no longer have the time to spare to spend with their children and foster any interest. Grandparents have the time but often live far away. In this case our generations are partly to blame.

Stamps and letters with the advent of the internet and the demise of stamp shops mean that stamps are remote from their daily lives.

Children work far harder at school than we did as exams are more important - their time is limited.

Personal View

I have four children and ten grandchildren (11 up to 26), who were in private and state education. None of them has any interest in philately in spite of my best efforts, for all of the views above, with which I completely agree. To the above I would add that we need to change our image, which is of old men collecting stamps and fly specs; nerds, anoraks or whatever you wish. I have covered that later.

b. Retired or Retiring

This was seen to be in the short and medium term the best audience. It suffered from the disadvantage that as described above there is no longer a pool of

potential members, who already have an interest. However, many retirees now have better health, more money and more time on their hands and thus have the potential to be philatelists. We need to reach them.

Current 'Lone' Philatelists. These were thought to be a dead end. Nobody knew anyone who wasn't a member of a society. **Comment** However, my postman who delivered someone else's copy of Cover Lover to my door told me he delivered several of these in the area. So they exist but aren't the 'club type'.

RETENTION

This is as important as recruitment. Most societies seem to have churn. SDPS loses members mainly through ill-health, giving up philately, and moving to be close to relatives. Members join by moving into the area, the closing of their local society, or by word of mouth. A few members 'disappear' with no reason given.

CURRENT MEMBERS

- 1. This is an area where there is already some discussion. Retention of current members is important. We need to give members what they want and what suits them. But what works in one society doesn't necessarily work in another. Some areas for consideration:
- a. Striking the correct balance for members in the programme between the very serious collector and those more amateur collector more interested in swapping, bourses etc.
- b. Day or evening meetings or a mixture of both. **Comment** SDPS is mainly evenings. We have looked at it several times and basically while we would gain a couple of attendees by having day meetings we would lose a couple!
- c. How much social activity. **Comment**. This is an important part of why members join and attend. It should be a part of normal activity rather than just an annual event. SDPS are now doing much more.
- d. Avoidance of cliques. **Comment** We don't have them in SDPS but I have heard of them in other societies.
- e. The suggestions made by David Rennie in the ABPS of visiting members when sick and holding a competition for the Best Outside Speaker gained no support within SDPS. Yes concern for members with get-well-cards etc.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS

SDPS is lucky in that we have a strong committee. But other societies report difficulties and some have failed because of a lack of volunteers. It is noticeable that the same names appear on the committees of different philatelic societies. The majority of our committee members are on the committees of other societies. Societies need to have an active policy of replacements, not wait until somebody leaves or resigns. This problem is very common in other clubs and societies, not just the philatelic world.

Wishing for a Lady McLeod?



Anyone with a Trinidad collection will aspire to own a 'Lady McLeod', like this one. The thing that makes the Lady McLeod stamp so alluring is the fact that it has a story. Not only is it SG 1, and the first label used for postage in the British Empire; there is a wonderful social history account around the triple-

masted steamer used on the stamp. There is also much to tell about her Captain, David Bryce, and the businesses associated with the Lady McLeod covers that exist. But Lady McLeods are expensive to buy and hard to come by! So, whilst you are hoping, or saving and waiting for 'the auction', one option is that of collecting some of the stamps, covers and memorabilia associated with the steamer and the Lady McLeod labels. The philatelic cover below is an early example of someone doing exactly that. It was posted in 1947, only five years

after the inauguration of what is now the Philatelic Society of Trinidad and Tobago (PSTT).




Trinidad and Tobago has marked its Lady McLeod heritage with a number of stamp issues as overleaf.

New moves to revitalise competitions

In common with many other federations, having seen a reduction in the number of competition entries in recent years, we are making some experimental changes. In an effort to encourage more collectors to dip a toe into the exhibiting pool, we have introduced competitions requiring only eight sheets. These will run alongside the existing traditional sixteen-sheet competitions, which still form a

valuable stepping-stone to National level. Some societies run competitions for eight, nine or twelve sheets. We opted for eight as we consider it both a suitable starting point for development to sixteen sheets, and a size which might accommodate some niche topics or specialisations which will not stretch to 16 sheets. Last year, unable to use frames to display winning entries, we compiled the scans into A3 display books, arranged to show a row of four sheets, i.e. a whole row from a frame, at one view. Feedback was positive, as people enjoyed sitting at tables to read the exhibits at leisure. We feel that using authenticated copies of material at federation level will need to become the norm as it makes remote judging by experts from other areas much simpler, with no security issues for display. We recognise a need to encourage and help the less technologically confident members of our societies to embrace the new technology. Have other federations made changes? Please share your experiences, good or otherwise!

A presentation by **Lindy Bosworth** on the nationalistic gymnastics movement known as Sokol was enjoyed by members at the London meeting on 17th February. Begun in 1862 by Miroslav Tyrš, who aimed for 'a strong mind in a fit body', with the financial backing of Jindřich Fügner, its growing popularity was seen as a threat by the Austrian authorities. The first Slet, or gathering, was held in 1882, while the second was moved to Cesky Brod as an alternative to an outright ban. Although there is little philatelic material for the early period, there were plenty of colourful postcards to see, and during the interwar years the amount of postal history and stationery items produced grew steadily. By 1938 the

organization had units worldwide, and the 10th Slet held to coincide with the 20th anniversary of the Czechoslovak state had the theme 'Build and Defend'. War clouds were gathering, however, and Sokol was banned once again under the Nazis. After WWII the organization continued its stop-start story – the communists soon saw it as a threat and it was replaced by the Spartakiada games. Other groups set up competing organizations over the years, and Lindy showed material from the Dělnická télovychovná jednota (DTJ – Workers Gymnastic Union), the Catholic Church's 'Orel' (eagle) organization, and the

Jewish Makabi games. Many of these are still in existence. With a wealth of illustrative material, this presentation was much appreciated by the members.

Victoria Jubilee Issue: Part 1. We learned about the work of Warren William de la Rue and saw many die proofs and unique striking-book pieces, and were

taken through the intricacies of sheet layout and the addition of framing lines and colour bars between panes to even out pressure on printing rollers. David explained the difficulty of finding early examples on cover, since at the issue date of January 1st 1887 the Post Office still had large stocks of the lilac-and-green issue. Much of this material has informed the updating of the Gibbons Specialised Catalogue. **Stephen Parkin** showed *Edinburgh District Post*, using material ranging from early unofficial district posts through to the 1860s. The display boasted many 'only recorded' and 'earliest/latest' items and included a Mulready letter sheet printed with a rates demand. The attendees' afternoon displays were: *North Western TPO, Parcel Post using the Jubilee 4½d, Leeds Postal History, Hull Postal History, KGVI surface rates to the USA, Railway Letters/Parcels, Crossing the River Spey and KGVI Guide Marks on the Square High Values*. A good buffet lunch and 'bottomless' tea/coffee completed the day.

Italy and Colonies

We are now in a pattern of two auctions per year, and three editions of our multi-award-winning Fil-Italia journal, in its 49th year of publication. There will be a members' weekend at the end of September. Malaya Study Group

In January Michael Waugh gave a presentation on Censorship WWI and WWII. In fact, Censorship can be traced back to the Boer War in South Africa on correspondence via Singapore to Netherlands East Indies. WWI showed the British Empire at its most powerful. Shipping mail from and via Singapore from Siam, Philippines, and Netherlands East Indies and to a lesser extent via Penang was censored. Michael showed many different examples of censor labels and cancellations as well as internal censorship in Penang to the Straits Echo in 1915. Rangoon, Madras, Bombay and Colombo also censored post from Malaya. Most philatelists probably have examples of censorship in Malaya in WWII. The late Malcolm Wade (The Malayan Philatelist 22.17-26) defined all the variety of types used together with transit censorship markings for airmail. Michael also covered military censorship. February's meeting was on covers With a Story to Tell. Five members gave fascinating and often sad stories mostly to do with the Fall of Singapore, Express, Registered Mail under Occupation and Andrew Norris told about a British Red Cross Nurse from 1945 and Repatriation Work for Prisoners of War. In March we held the Annual General Meeting and Auction. Like most societies, attendance figures are down post-Covid. Many factors have caused this. The Auction disproved lack of interest

with high prices still for good material. We welcome **John Rooke** of Edinburgh as a vital member of the Auction Team. *Michael Waugh FRPSL*

National

The first London meeting of the year featured a display of *Argentina* by **Ian King**, which included issues from 1858 to the present. Rare postal history from the Falklands Islands and Dependencies during the WWII was one of the highlights of our virtual meeting in April. There was censored mail, garrison mail, official mail and mail from Operation Tabarin, a two-year secret Naval expedition to the Antarctic from 1943–5 with the aim of thwarting enemy activities in the region. We always enjoy the displays given by the 'regions' as they provide a diversity of material, much not previously seen. On 8th February it was the turn of the West Midlands region, covering the counties of Shropshire, Staffordshire, Warwickshire and Worcestershire. Material provided by 18 members filled 56 frames, the displays having been brought together by **Gerald Marriner FRPSL**. **Gordon Eubanks FRPSL** gave an outstanding display of the *First Stamps of the United States* on 22nd February. The two values were issued on 1st July 1847: 5 cents and 10 cents for half-ounce letters travelling up to or over 300 miles respectively. The material shown was incredible, with many unique

Among the items shown was a cover sent on 7th June 1851 from New York bearing a strip of ten of the 5 cent, the largest recorded multiple of the stamp on cover. The increasing popularity of thematic collecting led to the formation of the British Thematic Association (BTA) in 1984. For its 40th anniversary, the BTA presented an afternoon of displays on 21st March. The BTA Chairman, **Barry Stagg FRPSL**, explained that the aim was to demonstrate the diversity of material members collect, not just thematics but also open philately and postcards. Indeed, the afternoon was titled *Showcasing the World of Pictorial Collecting*.

Early aircraft were thought of as dragons in the sky and Chinese airmails could therefore be described as being carried - ON DRAGONS' WINGS. Whilst the Chinese Bureau of Posts recognised earlier than most the benefits of an aerial postal service and provided funds for this purpose, progress was not always as rapid as it should have been. The display illustrated the story of Chinese airmail until 1940

including international flights to and from China. There were pioneer, experimental, and other flights until 1932, notably including the Handley Page, Peking-Tientsin and return flights on 7th May 1920; the Internal Airlines 1929-1941 comprising trial, first and later flights under their contracts for carrying mail by China National Aviation Corporation (Pan Am & the Chinese Government), Eurasia Aviation Corporation (Lufthansa & the Chinese Government) and Southwestern Aviation Corporation (Kwangtung Provincial Government). Next Aero Postal History covers were shown including instructional, directional and other postal markings and a number of interrupted flights (Crash Covers). Various rates were shown throughout the display. Brian acknowledged translations from Chinese, courtesy of the late **Gregory WK Loh MBE**, former member of the society.

Alan Hammond spoke about People Travel.....by Mail!, covering Scotland, the Southwest and, closer to home, the Dorking/Ockley Postbus. Simon Burke showed his prize-winning exhibit of Penny Farthing Cards, plus Pigeon Post operated by the Royal Navy. Charles Smith brought Gandon,

designer of the Marianne which has appeared in various guises on French definitives over the years as an allegory of the Republic, wearing a tricolor cockade. suspended during WWI. It was the Home Depot, in London, that dealt with mail going out to troops. Some of the returned covers bore very poignant cachets, especially when the particular serviceman had been killed. Finally there were covers that exemplified the shortage of paper as the war had progressed, including envelopes made from account ledgers, wallpaper and the re-use of old envelopes.

In January we enjoyed **Bill Shand's** *Straits Settlements* display, which ranged from early overprints on Labuan reply cards through WWI censorship and scarce early airmails to late fee, paquebot and railway mail. In complete contrast, at the next meeting member **Malcolm Rosenberg** educated us about the relatively short-lived 'Post and Go' scheme, high values of which are difficult to find, before entertaining us with (sadly not live) Pop Music, from the Beatles to

Queen. In February Neil Ritchie brought Russia, WWI and Beyond, describing armies bogged down in marshes and censorship anomalies - mute cancels on fronts of covers which had identifiable markings on their backs! We also heard of the Allied involvement in Northern Russia and the role of the supply convoys. Brian Coop graciously forgave our very thin turn-out for his Nyasaland and Mozambique display which included overprints, postal stationery, specimens and revenues of an area unfamiliar to us all. Rodney Knight visited in March, showing China. He outlined and illustrated the postal service from 1865 to modern times, mentioning the difficulties

caused in the early period by the currency having different values in different areas. Most recently, **Mike Lewis** showed us *King Edward VIII*, illustrating the planned accession issue and showing preparatory work for the eventual four definitives. EVIIIR meter marks were used long after the abdication. Mike's second half was *Illustrated and Advertising Envelopes*, a wonderful selection of artistry and ingenuity from Mulready sheets onwards. *Daphne McMillan*

The Cromwell Museum issued a set of covers showing Oliver Cromwell and celebrating the 350th anniversary of the civil war and these were shown. An example of a cover sent on the 28th February 1997 via the West Hunts Post Bus to St Neots came next. Broadcasting licences from the 1950s were followed by a cover commemorating the visit by the mayor of Huntingdon in July 2017 to the 350th anniversary celebrations in Huntingdon, Long Island. For our April meeting **Bob Wheeler** of Totnes showed an outstanding display of *Great Britain with a Difference*. It was all about the developments leading up to the introduction of the first postage stamp - the Penny Black. To avoid forgery the design incorporated intricate engine turning in the background and also a system of lettering in the bottom two corners of the stamps and the use of watermarked paper. We saw an example of the watermark and how it was impressed into the paper. Bob showed examples of the engine turning

designs considered and of the work submitted by various printers to the authorities, including some examples of lottery tickets from the 1820s. In the end Perkins Bacon were selected as the printers. Bob explained that as a result of the decision to change the colour of the penny stamp colour trials were carried out together with trials of the inks that could be used for their cancelling. Examples of the colour trials were shown. The penny red eventually replaced the black – first with an imperforate variety and then a perforated variety and Bob was able to show some of the perforation trials that were considered. The display continued with an array of rarely seen items including essays, proofs (die and plate), dummy stamps including some produced by McCorquodale, the Minerva essays of De La Rue and a selection of private parcel stamps.

In March **Rex Dixon** presented a comprehensive display on the complexities of the *Balkans between* 1918 and the end of *WWII*. As maps were redrawn after WWI, ententes between different nations were formed to try and protect national interests, but some countries bore heavy losses (such as Hungary), while others (like Romania) expanded hugely. The latter was well-illustrated philatelically, as Romania was in the habit of issuing copious commemoratives – King Charles who declared himself king in 1930 was a playboy and a stamp collector! The rise of Fascism in

the 1930s led to further changes to the Balkan map – Hungary took Transylvania back from Romania, for example, and issued plenty of philatelic souvenirs to mark the occasion. Italy also took part in the scramble for territory, leading to a great many overprinted stamps for use in parts of dismembered Yugoslavia. Romania got back in the action by joining Germany in Operation Barbarossa, once more marked with plenty of commemorative stamp issues – including ones to mark the recovery of Bucovina and Bessarabia, that had been awarded to them after WWI, and then lost to the Russians in 1940. The dozen or so members present were highly appreciative of this clear and wide-ranging exposition on a highly complex subject.

He also told us about Lonesome George who was apparently a long-lived tortoise in the Galapagos. **Arthur Jennion** gave an entertaining display on *Mail on the Liverpool Manchester Railway*. His material covered many aspects about the planning and opening of the railway - the Rainhill Trials. He also had a collection of coins and medals and even a piece of the original track! Ringwood

The Annual Club Competition

The judging of the entries took place prior to the event, so that entrants could both obtain feedback and discuss their entries within the meeting. **Roy Barnett** presented his *Wilding Definitives of GB*. **Michael Goodman** provided *USA Postal Stationery Rates and Instructional Markings/Redirection of Mail*, together with *USA Postal Stationery from 1870-94*. **John Stevens** showed *The Life of King Bhumibol, Rama 9th of Thailand*'. This King had the second longest reign of any monarch, some 70 years. Of note, the longest stamp (170cms) was issued

following the monarch's death in 2016. Simon Casalis de Pury revealed his fascinating French origin displaying Family History in Covers from 1878. Other family items were FDCs, military and childhood mail, from various African countries. He also presented his Novice entry Birds of Zambia. John Davis displayed Free Territory of Trieste (FTT) Zone B Yugoslav Military Government 1948-54. Gordon Masson shared his recently acquired Empire Overprints

and Surcharges and Commonwealth items, including an illustrated Churchill postcard, together with a cover and personal letter from King Charles III's Office in recognition of family voluntary work over 50 years. **David Etchells** concluded with *Investigating a 1793 Free Frank Front,* which particularly celebrated a cover postmarked 2nd April 1783 FFF, from MP/ Solicitor General Joseph Jekyll which, from 1600s to 1840, allowed MPs to send their mail with no postal charges. (Gertrude Jekyll and R L Stevenson connections!) This cover encourages David to continue further fascinating research.

Rochdale

Ken Knight presented displays from the late 19th to the early 20th century on *Middle East*, beginning with covers from Italian-run postal services prior to being taken over by the newly created Egyptian post office. Further items shown included postal circular seals, stamps issued to collect salt tax, river/rail travelling post office cancellations and many perfins. We continued up the Nile with stamps first issued in Sudan (genuine and forgeries from this period). Finally military (WWI) themed stamps, covers and postcards were shown from Turkey, Egypt, Syria and Jordan. **Jack Lindley** our New Zealand collector brought along a fascinating collection of postcards from down under. The first

postcards issued in 1874 were plain and cost a penny. Cards with pictures began in the 1890s. What is claimed to be the world's smallest postcards appeared in 1892 by the Austin Walsh company, contained inside Atlas cigarette packets. These pre-paid postcards were to encourage smokers to enter the supplier's competitions. Many cards were issued during the Boer War, popular with volunteers who went off to war together with their own horses. One side-collection Jack showed was the matching of postcard pictures with similar views on stamps. Our April meeting consisted of members' philatelic material beginning with the

letters D, E and F. These were World Heritage Sites, A Collection of 19th
Century Double-sided Letters, Maltese Letters Suffering from Deficient Postage
and Hyper-inflation Period in Hungary (1945/46).

We were captivated by the fascinating display of their family history and the associated philatelic material. Conquest by Napolean resulted in French reforms that led to unification resulting in the first issue of stamps in 1852, although it was not compulsory to use stamps until 1871. Philip's

collection ended in 2001 with an unusual metallic silver stamp – the last denominated in guilders for basic registered overseas mail. Helen Soby
