

They are so good that our Chair asked for them to be put on the website so that anyone can see them and perhaps start their own progress, based on those ideas, or others that they have developed. It is always gratifying



to get a response - even a negative one can be interesting, even if I disagree. I have also had the opportunity to visit societies or groups that I have never visited before, for example a long trip to Surrey, visiting Guildford and a meeting at the home of the secretary and live wire of the West Indies Study Group (see the cake eaten at Guildford - not all by me - and pages 29 and 38). It was good to feel so welcome - and the journey was pleasant too. I haven't finished my wanderings as so far I have agreed to visit three more societies at least, as well as the York Fair and a society weekend. The social side of our

hobby suits me - watch out, you never know where I might get to.

Sadly I still hear of societies which are in danger of closing because no one will volunteer to take part of the organising over and do something to relieve the burden on a few people who have been working hard at it for years. Come on folk - give it a go, take over a small or big part.

Another sadness is when societies decide that they no longer want to be affiliated. Is this a failing on our part in making it clear what the Association is about? It is not just for those who like taking part in competitions - I don't for one. I know that sometimes it is the rising costs of room hire and falling numbers of members that trigger the decision to withdraw. But dare I ask, when was the last time that they increased their annual subscription? I know that many societies are still charging the equivalent of between three and five cups of coffee for a year's membership, but the members will pay more than that for a single item at a Fair and even more in an Auction. Don't forget that if there is a short-term problem that requires some help, the Small Grants Scheme from ABPS might well give you sufficient time to make adjustments or new arrangements so that the society can carry on and stay as part of the British philatelic community. We are willing to help, by telling you what we are about and if necessary by considering requests for financial aid. Next time - me at EuroPhilEx. *Keith Burton*

Obituaries

Dave & Moira Edwards

It is with great sadness that the Channel Islands Specialists' Society (C.I.S.S.) advises that its former Membership Secretary, Moira Edwards, and former Chairman, Dave Edwards, died within a week of each other in November 2024. David and Moira joined the C.I.S.S. in 1995. A quiet couple, their main interest was Channel Island postcards. They formed a superb collection including almost complete runs of the Allix and LL cards.

David was born on the UK mainland. His parents had been evacuated from Guernsey in 1940. Following the liberation the family returned to Guernsey where he was educated. David met Moira whilst at Cardiff University, where they both studied teaching. Following their graduation, David became a teacher and they took up a two-year posting to the Gilbert Islands (now known as Kiribati). On their return to England, they settled in Sandon, Essex and David took up positions in various schools teaching science.

They entered the C.I.S.S. annual Postcard Competition and between them won 13 of the 16 competitions held between 2002 and 2017.

In September 2002 they took over running the circulating packet service which they efficiently operated until 2007 when Moira then took on the Membership Secretary's role, which she held until 2017. In 2009 David took on the role of Chairman of the society, which he managed until 2017.

Moira passed away on the 23rd of November 2024 and David six days later on 29th November 2024. Their funeral took place on 15th January 2025 at Chelmsford Crematorium. It was well attended including six members of the C.I.S.S present. *Steve Wells*

Congress Medal 2025

The Association of British Philatelic Societies is delighted to announce that this year's recipient of the prestigious Congress Medal is **Jon Aitchison, FRPSL**.

Jon is the Chairman and principal organiser of EuroPhilEx Birmingham 2025 International Exhibition. He gained experience of organising an International Exhibition as he was on the Organising Committee of EuroPhilEx London 2015.

In fact, Jon's work for International Exhibitions has resulted in his being the UK Commissioner at numerous exhibitions in different countries since 2015, often involving more than one a year. In addition, he is in charge of international commissioner appointments.



Being involved, at a high level, in conjunction with philatelic exhibitions and congresses has been one of Jon Aitchison's main contributions to organised philately. He has organised displays by members of the Royal Philatelic Society London at various events as a Council member of that Society. He has also been active for ABPS on the Exhibitions and International Committee. One of his main contributions being his drive to get various new classes adopted at national exhibitions as British national classes. Since 2016 Jon has been Keeper of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists and all that position entails.

Jon Aitchison has served on the committees of several specialist societies holding positions of President, Vice Chairman, Librarian or Auctioneer. His

collecting interest are various, of which the Channel Islands is his principal interest. In the late 1980s to early 1990s he was Advisor to the Landmark Trust and Lundy Island on philatelic matters and stamp issues. He has authored and published ten books on various subjects in connection with the Channel Islands as well as being a prolific contributor of articles for philatelic publications.

Looking at Jon's Philatelic Curriculum Vitae, he has been heavily involved in voluntary service for British philately since 2016. Considering his own admission that being principal organiser for EuroPhilEx has required two and a half year fulltime work it would have been understandable if he had stepped down from his demanding other philatelic positions. Not Jon, he has continued in the positions of Keeper of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists and his work on the ABPS Exhibitions and International Committee.

In June this year he will be off to Liberec, Czech Republic, as Commissioner for a European Stamp Exhibition.

Jon Aitchison was nominated by the Channel Islands Specialist Society and the Egypt Study Circle, Egyptian philately being another of his specialised collections. He has contributed to the Egypt Study Circle as President and meetings secretary for over six years.

Jon' Aitchison's outstanding voluntary service to British philately at national and international level makes him a worthy recipient of the Congress Medal for 2025. *Yvonne Wheatley*

Roll of Distinguished Philatelists

New Signatories for 2025

At the meeting of the Board of Election of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists on 6th February 2025, it was unanimously agreed that the following philatelists be invited to be the new signatories to the Roll:

Adriano Bergamini, RDP, Switzerland Birthe King, RDP, United Kingdom Eddie Leibu, RDP, Israel Simon Richards, RDP, United Kingdom

Birthe King, RDP, United Kingdom.

The name of Birthe King has become synonymous with the growth of Open Philately as an approach to collecting and exhibiting. Her promotional work has been seen across many countries and continents and her exhibits have gained high awards in competition. She has been a member and secretary of the FIP working group set up following the FIP Congress in Portugal in 2010 to examine



the new class of Open Philately. The new Open Philately Guidelines were agreed at the FIP Congress in Indonesia in 2012. The Class has been particularly popular in Europe, with more than 30 exhibits in competition at the London 2022 FIP international exhibition. As hoped, it has attracted numbers of new exhibitors who had previously not been involved in exhibiting.

As a Director of FEPA during the period 2013-2019, Birthe promoted the FEPA Regulations for Picture Postcards, combining the rules of several of the federations and consulting with prominent exhibitors of

picture postcards. These regulations were agreed at the FEPA Congress in Athens in 2015 and Picture Postcards were adopted as an FIP experimental class at their Congress in 2018.

Birthe has developed and exhibited her own Open Class exhibits, which have gained high awards at exhibitions. Among them, *Denmark: Conscience, Conflict and Camps 1932-1949* received large gold medals at Melbourne 2013 and London 2015 international exhibitions. This collection has also been featured as an Edition d'Or, published by Heinrich Köhler. The exhibit *The Re-Unification of Southern Jutland with Denmark 1864-1920* was awarded a gold medal at the Prague 2019 international.

Active in the promotion of Open Philately, articles by Birthe have been published in magazines in Europe, America and Asia promoting and explaining the concept as a collecting approach and its exhibiting. Birthe has delivered numerous PowerPoint presentations at local, national and international level and participated in discussion groups and seminars. She has also participated in several interviews for magazines and radio.

Apart from her international appointments with FEPA and FIP, Birthe has been a Council Member of the Royal Philatelic Society London from 2012-2019 and chairman of the Membership & Representatives Committee during that time.

Simon Richards, RDP, United Kingdom.

As a collector of a wide range of subjects, Simon Richards has been very active in philatelic collecting and exhibiting. He is chairman of the ABPS Exhibitions and International Committee and a director of Stamp World Exhibitions, in which roles he is much involved in the various UK and international exhibitions. He represented the UK at the FEPA Congress in Copenhagen in 2024.

He is a qualified FIP Juror and participated in the Jury at London 2022, Westpex 2024, San Francisco and Hafnia 2024, Copenhagen. Over the last year he has been acting-

President of the Royal Philatelic Society London during the illness of the President and was elected President upon the recent death of Mike Roberts. He is also a member of the Royal Expert Committee.

One of Simon's core collecting interests has been the stamps of the West Indies, and he continues as President of the West Indies Philatelic Study Group and runs the society's auction. He chaired the first meeting of the combined UK and USA societies of this collecting area at the Great American Stamp Show, in Hartford in 2024. He has been treasurer of the National Philatelic Society since 2001 and of the Stuart Rossiter Trust since 2015.

Among Simon's collections and exhibits, his *British West Indies Maritime Mail* was a candidate for the Grand Prix at Hunphilex, 2022 and won large gold at Stockholmia 2019 and IBRA, Essen, 2023. High awards have also been achieved for *The Postal History of Savoy, The Postal Stationery of Grenada* and *Classic Victoria* (Australia). These collections formed major displays to various societies, including to the Society of Postal Historians. His display of Dominica won the Tilleard Medal for the best 1:00pm display to the RPSL.

Simon has been the author of numerous articles on a wide range of subjects. Recently published is a much expanded and researched book entitled *Dominica: Philately to 1967.* This covers both the stamps and postal history and includes considerable original research from the National Archives at The British Library and Postal Museum that was not covered in previous volumes on the subject.



Rossiter Trust Seminar

Instead of an annual lecture, this year the Stuart Rossiter Trust is hosting a Seminar on "What is Postal History?". An all-day event, it will feature presentations and discussions from a team of six well-known specialist speakers with divergent views on a variety of aspects.

It will take place on Wednesday, 24th September 2025 at the Royal Philatelic Society, London (15 Abchurch Lane, London, EC4N 7BW). Attendance is free and light refreshments will be served. The Stuart Rossiter Trust Fund is a Charitable Trust supporting research and publication relating to the history of communication through postal systems of the world.

To date, the Trust has published 52 books on Postal History, and funded 29 research projects. It has also hosted 25 annual Lectures.

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Engaging with 'Collectors' from the Third Estate

Some personal thoughts

On my return from a very enjoyable "Annual Weekend" with the France & Colonies Philatelic Society near Stratford-upon-Avon, my wife (*that is the appellation she insists on*) greeted me with "Did you have fun?" and "How many did you kill?" She is not exactly into stamp collecting, but she is fascinated by my choice of light reading – the "Keller" books by Lawrence Block, in which a professional assassin intersperses his deadly work with a passion for collecting stamps. The author is a serious collector, indeed he has written a regular column for Linn's Stamp news, and the philatelic detail in the five books is very engaging. But to my wife the association of my going away for a day or two with 'stamps' as cover for reducing the world's population is intriguing.

Two weeks later I went to the two-day Kempton Park Stamp Fair, another very enjoyable experience, but only after giving a guarantee that I did not have a secondary lethal motive.

One aspect of both events was that there was plenty of time for chatting with old and new friends about some of the wider issues that are challenging philately. I need not dwell on these as they have been well covered for years in this newsletter and other places: ageing philatelists, lack of younger members, closure of stamp clubs and shops, fewer people using stamps for the purposes for which they were intended etc.

So informally I asked several others what our hobby is, and how we should describe ourselves. This often proved quite humorous. Are a group of philatelists "a pinnacle" as they strive to reach excellence, and a group of stamp collectors "an album" as they seek to expand their collections? Is it "a pinnacle" because the achievement of gold medal collections, which require extensive research, includes the ownership of unique material, and ascent over time of a pyramid from local to regional to national, and finally the pinnacle of international recognition? Is it an "album" because competition is not necessarily excluded but the pursuit of ever more material, written up for enjoyment, embracing ever more themes or topics, as a more dominant characteristic? There was no agreement on this of course, but a broad understanding that there are important differences, and these affect the nature of stamp communities that will attract, or put off, new members.

One topic that interested others was my recent experience in utilising eBay to reach stamp collectors who probably do not belong to stamp clubs, or display their treasures, or even attend local or national fairs? Does eBay reach (to hark back to the French Revolution) a 'third estate' of stamp collectors, who operate below the radar of the first estate of national societies and Stampex exhibitors, and the second estate of club members and attendees of local fairs? I thought that there might be. So they challenged me to write (briefly) about it.

Four years ago I was asked to meet with a lady who wished to dispose of her late father's collection. This was housed in several WH Smith spiral bound albums, and SG cover albums. It comprised a world-wide collection of used stamps circa 1970-1990, together with quite a large number of Royal Mail issued First Day covers. Apart from being grouped by country in the albums, the stamps were not written up, were not in any form of chronological or topical grouping, and some were damaged or poorly hinged. She had contacted one or two dealers who were in her words 'not particularly interested' as most of the stamps were of 'common usage', postally used, and included many Asian, East European, and South American countries that were not particularly sought after. They also explained that there was a glut of GB covers on the market. The remarks were fair and little money was offered. She therefore wondered if we might enter the collection at our next club auction? However, we were just recovering from the Covid shut-downs, only small numbers of people were returning to our auctions the display in the albums did not indicate the likelihood of finding many 'hidden gems', and it was unlikely to attract many bidders. As we talked through the options the owner made it very clear that she did not want any money for the collection. Her priority was that the collection her beloved father had built up over many years, and especially when he was seriously ill, should go to other collectors. In a sense so that his collection should live on, and the enjoyment of the stamps would be passed on to others. The one thing she did not want was for some items to be sold if possible but the majority to probably eventually be regarded as rubbish.

We agreed that I would try and honour this commitment, and I embarked on the disposal of the collection to collectors who would prize the stamps and covers, with the proviso that if there were any funds generated these would be donated to the Alzheimer's Society. So over the last four years I slowly donated some elements of the collection to KidsActive and other charities, offered small selections at local auctions, but broke the bulk down into very small lots and offered these on eBay.

As a result over 600 lots eventually sold on eBay with an average realisation of about £2.00. Taking into account postage and fees (eBay still charged fees for most of this period) there was a small surplus which went to the Alzheimer's Society as requested. These offers of small, low-priced lots, with the stamps described, scanned and off paper, was to facilitate the commitment to rehome as much of the collection as possible with other collectors. The simpler bundling of countries still on album leaves would have taken much less time and probably produced a similar revenue, but risked the cherry picking of a few stamps and then disposal of the rest more likely.

The success of these lots through eBay was quite a revelation. Firstly, they all sold, although it did take four years! Secondly, the feedback (when it was offered) was very positive, and in the phrases used showed that in many cases the stamps were very much appreciated by the new owners. Perhaps more importantly, as the sales slowly proceeded, I noted that the buyers were spread all over the country. In the final analysis there were buyers from every county in

the UK, from every region in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland, and even some (despite the listings specifying UK only) from Canada, the USA and Europe who somehow managed to make bids. I looked up many of the UK addresses on maps and whilst there were a number of London districts, the majority were from small communities, and often at some distance from larger towns. I also noted that in several cases the payee differed from the bidder in terms of title and gender, surmising that together with the phrasing of the feedback from some of these, the actual buyer was probably a younger person. So why did my friends suggest I wrote about this? Apart from the ability to reassure my wife that I had talked about stamps and not practiced the Assassin's Creed with them, they were amazed at the spread of active stamp collectors across the country as revealed by the bids received; the likely presence of a significant younger population amongst them; the variety of interests shown by bids for the stamps of every country and topic offered; the probability that many of them did not belong to clubs or attend many stamp fairs because of their geographic location; and the unsolicited feedback from strangers who took the brief opportunity to 'talk about their stamp collecting'. This initiative reinforced my belief that there is a large and active 'third estate' of stamp collectors in the United Kingdom and that digital connection is the key to creating collecting communities to supplement the local stamp clubs and stamp shops that are now struggling. My own society, like many others, is therefore investing more in Zoom meetings, on-line forums, and postings on social media. We are also seeking to increase our face-to-face outreach through a club presence at national and regional fairs, and to supplement our former regional meetings where travel and suitable space is an issue with very local gatherings, in coffee shops or pubs as well as in parish rooms etc. Next March we will be holding our 50th Annual Members Weekend in Stratford-upon-Avon and I hope that once I have reassured my wife that I am going away to talk about stamps and not as a contract killer - that our chatting will be about how these activities are engaging with more of this 'third estate' of collectors and, although our primary interest is French and Colonies stamps, we will not need to replay the French Revolution. DOOM AND GLOOM - "We can't get new members", "I offered my collection to my grandkids and they didn't want it" and "young people are just not interested". Comments, or words to that effect, that I've heard several times and which I suspect other readers have heard and maybe have even said.

All a bit doom and gloomy, much like the picture on my parent's first TV, which weighed a ton, took up a whole corner of the living room, and showed a grainy, black and white picture that went fuzzy whenever the wind blew, or it rained too hard. Is this the TV you'd watch now, or buy for your grandchildren?

I suspect that most people's answers to both those questions is an emphatic "No" and that instead they watch a sleek, thin, wall-mounted, colour TV with a picture quality their parents could only dream of.

The world of TV has changed and we've happily moved with it, so why then are we surprised when our offspring are not interested in taking over our stamp collections which are in the same format that our parents collected stamps, or that we can't attract new members when our societies are substantially unchanged since their formation.

To engage our offspring and new members we need to make our hobby and societies more relevant to their (our) world, by adopting and embracing the various digital technologies, such as Artificial Intelligence, Facebook, YouTube, Podcasts, Google etc all of which can enhance the enjoyment and exercise of our hobby, as could membership of online communities such as Stampworld.

For example, it took less than 30 seconds using artificial intelligence, to create the picture on the front cover, showing different generations enjoying philately with the technology available through the ages, from a physical album and magnifying glass, to managing an album online, to scanning a stamp with digital facial recognition technology to count the perforations.

Similarly, identifying a stamp is so much easier and cheaper, searching for a match using the images section of Google search, rather than having to look through a catalogue.

This is not the first time we've had to adapt our hobby and societies. With the advent of the internet we developed websites and when the pandemic hit, we moved to online Zoom meetings, but to stay relevant in a changing world we need to continue to change with it. A challenge, but one that with the support of organisations like ABPS, we're perfectly capable of conquering. **BLUE SKIES AND SUNSHINE**. **David Smith**

The Idea of Letterboxes goes back to the 17th Century when outward-bound ships would leave messages on the Island for the next ship to take home.


Today there are some 22 or more Letterbox Walks around the Island and at the end of each walk a Box can be found containing a log book and a rubber stamp to

prove that someone was at the letterbox.

Sister's Peak is one of the most recently active volcanic peaks (500 to 700 years ago) of the island and dominates

the skyline. The current series of boxes began being set-up by Sean Newbery, the BBC Resident Engineer and keen walker.

A path was cut to the top in 1972 when it was opened as the Hannay Pass but is also famed as being the first 'letter box' walk along with Letterbox to have been established on the Island.

Anniversary of the Liberation. At the same meeting David Gurney FRPSL was awarded Honorary Life Membership, recognising his substantial contribution to the society. David joined in November 1970. In September 1974 he became Packet Superintendent, which he held until June 1995, then becoming Auction Secretary. In June 1999, David took on editing our Journal, a post which he held until December 2023. He became the third president of the society, after founders Bill Newport and John Simpson. David wrote many of the standard reference books on Channel Islands philately, including Channel Islands Sub-Post Offices and their Postmarks (1983), Red Cross Postal

Message Scheme with the Channel Islands during the Occupation 1940 – 45 (1992), The Post Offices of the Smaller Channel Islands (1993), The Postal History of the Guernsey Sub-Post Offices (1995), The Postal History of the

Jersey Sub-Post Offices (1995) and Letter Forwarding Agents of Great Britain handling Channel Islands letters 1673 – 1855 (2011). He celebrated his 90th birthday in April. → https://www.ciss.uk/ Steve Wells

The Czechoslovak PS of GB

Our first 2025 London meeting was on 22nd February 2025 at the Dean Swift pub near Tower Bridge – **Mark Bailey** gave a rich and varied display on *Expo 58*, the 1958 Brussels World's Fair, including stamp issues, cinderellas, and other philatelic items. The logo for the event was by Lucien De Roeck and featured a five-pointed asymmetrical star. An additional design promoted the idea of 'building the world for mankind', and both were used to create publicity labels – Mark had blocks and sheets of these,

together with examples of their use. One of the iconic features of the Fair was the 'Atomium', a giant model of an iron crystal that visitors could enter and explore using the tunnels and escalators that connected each part of the structure. This landmark naturally featured on many of the stamp issues and First Day Covers. Czechoslovakia was the third country to issue stamps for Expo 58: a set of five issued on 25th March 1958, promoting the national products on show, just before the opening of the Fair, and a later stamp with an illustration of the Czechoslovak pavilion. Decorative Bohemian glassware won a Grand Prix, commemorated on a special label. Many countries produced commemorative matchbox labels – including Czechoslovakia – as well as special cigar bands! There was a wealth of supplementary material on display – such as a leaflet advertising loaves of bread with coupons incorporated into the packaging, which could be redeemed for entry tickets. → www.cpsgb.org.uk Tony Holdsworth



By means of an incredible display and presentation, **Daphne McMillan** inspired members at a meeting on 20th February with a look at the life, reign and family of King George VI. Through a mixture of photographs, postcards, letters, stamps and covers, the story was told of this much-loved King, christened Albert, who came to the throne in 1936 following the abdication of his brother, King Edward VIII. From mail carried by balloon to the time of the Spanish Civil War, **Eduardo Consejo** guided members through *Airmail Related to Spain 1870-1936* by means of a display and presentation on 20th March. The evolution of airmail relating to Spain was told through pieces flown to and from the country, but also flown from and to territories with a clear connection to Spain. Eduardo has no fewer than 37 items of Ballon Monté mail during the Siege of Paris. We were treated to several 'firsts' at the display and presentation given by **Stefan Heijtz** on *The Postal History of the Faroe Islands 1751-1945* in April. We saw the earliest known example of mail from the islands, the earliest known letter into the islands from Denmark and the earliest known Registered letter sent from Copenhagen.



Michael Musgrave took us through some more obscure, and mostly uncatalogued, *Aspects of Australian Philately*. After a large interpanneau block of King George V, his first major section showed how Australia handled postage due after PD stamps ceased, notably cards sent to the sender to collect the due sum and the postal markings on detained covers before and after payment. Next came reprint "Koala" and "Kangaroo" markings. A large selection of personalised stamps was followed by a wide range of covers and labels used for premium and economy services. Postage labels were introduced in Australia circa 1960 and numerous types were shown, including the later types sharing design features with definitive stamps and some used for special events or stamp shortages. 

In February **Robert McMillan** presented *Kingston upon Hull Postal History*. He began with examples of post from the time of King Charles II through to the early 1840s. Early letters were before postmasters and contained many abbreviations including bishop marks. Robert explained how most mail from Hull was transported by horseback to York and thence on mail-coach to London. He presented examples of markings from Hull and also postmarks from various places coming into Hull. From 1840, there were examples of Rowland Hill's Mulready sheet, including one from the second day of issue, and also examples of caricatures of the Mulready. The second lay-down had a focus on ship letters. Of course, Hull is sited at the confluence of the Hull and the Humber and

obtained a royal charter in 1299. The display contained an amusing mistake, with one letter from Leeds to Hull originally marked as a 'ship letter'! In March Rodney Knight presented on Spain and the Spanish Colonies. The focus of the first round was Spain itself and included frames on a thematic collection of Spain, celebrating civilisation in Spain from the Palaeolithic through to C20 art and architecture, pre-stamp covers, Spanish railway postmarks, the Province of Valencia, post-1950, especially covers celebrating trade

fairs, advertising covers 1900-1946, postal stationery, including aerograms, and charity stamps. The second round was on the Spanish colonies, including Cuba,

Puerto Rico, the Philippines and Spanish North Africa (including Morocco and the Spanish Sahara).

At our meeting in January we were shown philatelic items from the *United Nations part 3* having previously seen parts 1 and 2. This was the final part of a collection of United Nations philatelic collection by a past member of Cambridge PS, donated to the society. Stamps from various countries commemorating the UN included Honduras, Germany, Cuba, Luxembourg, Liban, Italy and Syria. From 1922 Switzerland issued stamps for use of the International organizations situated there and examples were shown. Mail showing slogan cancellations on mail came next. We then saw the 1970 issue which came out on the 22nd September along with details of the designers of the stamps. On the 7th April 1972 they issued stamps for World Health Day and we were shown them in blocks of four. These were followed by the Economics Commission and Art series sets. In 1975 they commemorated the 30th anniversary of the UN charter and peace keeping relations. The 1980 stamps commemorating 35th Anniversary of the UN were shown as blocks of four. 1600 000 of each value were printed. Examples on mail carried slogan cancellations. During the issues of the 1961-62 stamps the emblem was replaced by an outline of the UN building. In 1961 an official photograph of the UN Children's Fund and Economic Commission for Latin America stamps was released to the press as were the issues for 1962. The evening ended with examples of commercial postage and meter franking. David Birkett

Members have enjoyed Zoom presentations on Transatlantic Airmail 1928-39, Pigeons in Communications WWI, India to Scotland Mail 1817-39, Cameroons WWII Censored Mail. Imperial Airways Africa Service 2 and Norfolk Social History. Mike Kentzer and Terry Wagg entertained members at the first monthly meeting with Postal History Pot Pourri and The Life of the GB 1/2d. The Falklands, Argentina and Uruguay featured strongly in this industrial development, and their postal facilities were vital to communication. Post took an age to be delivered, whether inward or outbound, and for 8 months of the vear, weather conditions prevented movement. The wealth of correspondence displayed, both commercial and private, was considerable. Maps and photos, were to the fore, and stamps, cancels, letters and covers abounded. Many items were rare and of much value. Talking of such scarcity, Hugh revealed a South Shetland cover. Find another one but that is another story! Paul Barry



Rochdale

At our February meeting, member **David Hudson** presented A History of GB Postage Due Stamps from 1914 to 2000, when their use ceased, David discussed the complex rules and regulations covering the many factors relating to postage due and postage return charges. These included weight, size, delivery attempts and return-to-sender costs. Postcards had onerous rules to distinguish them from normal letters, such as the number of words and subject matter. Specific regulations were introduced to prevent postcards masquerading as letters to avoid higher post charges. David said that he gets pleasure from his detective work, trying to work out why charges have been made and under what circumstances they are applied. Pete Best gave a talk primarily on Armed Forces Covers from Malta in the period of WWI and WWII. Most post, including civilian had to run the gauntlet of censorship, particularly armed services personnel, prisoners of war, hospitals and convalescent facilities for war casualties. Pete displayed many samples of covers showing a fascinating variety of official censorship hand stamps under the headings of: Opened under Martial Law, Passed by censor (number) and Damaged by Immersion in Saltwater. Our April meeting was dedicated to members' displays on subjects beginning with the letters G/H/I. The results included George V stamps in Malta, Hungarian Stamps, from 1910/1918 and Irish Diamond Postmarks. Peter Grimshaw

West Riding

Our 2025 season of informal meetings continues. February brought a series of members' displays on W, X, Y and Z - Charles Squire brought his Wales Collection. Jonathan Taylor showed WWI Knockaloe Internment Camp. a WWI internment camp on the Isle of Man, at Knockaloe Farm in the parish of Patrick, near Peel, which housed 23 000 prisoners-of-war and 3000 guards between 1914 and 1919, showing examples of free post mail used by prisoners. Brian Wilkinson showered us with Xmas Yemen and Zaire, Ken Moody showed Zanzibar 1890-1977 and Adrian Lee covered Zante, one of the United States of Ionian Islands. March brought Dave Druett out of hibernation to show us his Trinidad collection which was covered in depth with examples of interisland hand stamps, Perkins Bacon line-engraved, explaining that the narrow sheet margins prevented later perforation and the humid conditions activated gum causing shortages of stock resulting in Charles Petit lithographed issues, followed by the 1858 requirement for mail to be prepaid and examples of the hand perforations. The display moved on to the DLR contract issues and the o/ printed surcharged one penny issues brought about by Trinidad joining the UPU in 1879. with examples of manuscript red ink, DLR surface-printed examples, 1882 Revenues FEE o/print post due and postal stationery. Dave also showed examples of WWII censored mail from South America passing through the censors stationed in Trinidad and Bermuda - a treat for all. Adrian Lee


York


