#### NOTES FROM THE CHAIR:

2024! Where do the weeks, months and years go? The more philatelic material I have to write up, the faster time seems to go. When I retired some years ago, I had this notion that I would have all the time I needed to write material up and expand my collections. I think even now, I need at least another 30 years to catch up - and that's ignoring all the material I might buy as time goes on!



In reading philatelic magazines and journals, a new area of philately that is emerging is Context Philately. It goes beyond just collecting stamps based on their designs or countries of origin - it focuses on the historical and cultural context surrounding the stamps. Collectors in this new area are interested in understanding the stories behind the stamps, the events they commemorate, and their social or political significance. It's like putting the stamps in a historical narrative, turning them into small windows that offer glimpses into different eras and cultures. For example, a stamp might not only be valued for its aesthetic appeal or rarity but also for the represented historical moment, the personalities featured on it, or the cultural symbols it showcases. It adds an extra layer of meaning and to the hobby, making it a blend of history and philately. I will be very interested to see how Context Philately develops! Looking at what's happening in 2024, one of the stand-out events of the year is the Philatelic Congress of Great Britain in Southampton from 11<sup>th</sup> to 14<sup>th</sup> July. It will be based at the Leonardo Grand Harbour Hotel, close to the harbour and city centre. The programme will have as its theme new directions in philately with contributors from around the world exploring this area. We can share the latest developments and best practices in philately. This is an event for everyone with an interest in philately, with displays by local collectors as well as leading overseas collectors. The Roll of Distinguished Philatelists will be joining Congress this year to make it a very special event! Full details about Congress can be found in this edition of ABPS News.

One job we, the Executive Committee of the ABPS, always find difficult is finding new individuals who are willing to join us actively. At the moment we need to find a willing volunteer to take on the role of Director of Communications – to lead and manage all aspects of communications between ABPS and societies. federations and external audiences. ### **Editorial**

Recently it was pointed out to me that *real idiot* is an anagram of *editorial* nicely tying together two of my main leisure activities - crosswords and philately. Certainly both can take a lot of thought and time. Thinking of something new to write about every quarter is not easy and I feel that I might be becoming repetitive after



penning so many. How professional editors manage is beyond me - but perhaps their pay helps. This time I want to stress a few positives and ask a few questions. I am delighted to see the care shown by some societies and individuals in responding to the points raised about competitions, local societies and other matters in the past articles by David Rennie and Richard Smith. The consensus is not hopeful but more thought is likely to produce new ideas. My own society, unlike many, has increased the number of meetings - for a paltry annual fee we can now attend four meetings per month - two regular evening more formal meetings, one informal afternoon meeting and one Zoom meeting. Each contributes a different view of philately - social, focussed, researched, visual, even comedic. Informality allows for humour, exchange of information, material and views - don't forget we are in the hobby for fun too.

My questions relate to what you see as the point of ABPS. This has been brought home to me by societies that have withdrawn because they don't think that ABPS does anything for them - as the members don't do competitions at national or international level. Presumably they don't want there to be a national federation. Am I wrong in thinking that membership is about putting something into the situation? Ability, time, money, general support are all needed for a society, a group of societies in a federation or all the societies with common interests in a national federation. Do we have to expect to get something from our membership or affiliation all the time - or can we see the need to contribute to the whole picture, even if that does mean that we stop thinking that a paltry sum for our membership is enough (or too much in some cases)? I am sure that I am not alone in being willing to pay two- or three-figure sums for the right material (and I don't mean pence) but I am unusual in being willing to argue strongly for a fee that will provide the sums needed for my hobby to be run. We ask for answers and comments regularly - where are they? Probably I am preaching to the converted as you are still affiliated but if you know of unaffiliated societies can you ask them why they are being so isolated? What do we, as a whole, need to do and say to convince them that their hobby is under threat of extinction, or are local and specialist societies and federations content to be the 21st century dinosaurs?

If you live within 50 miles of Southampton (or further away) why not come to the Congress in July? You could exchange views and ideas with each other and ABPS and be involved in the future.

**Peter Pugh** 

20<sup>th</sup> February 1949 – 3<sup>rd</sup> November 2023 It is with great sadness that I relay the sadnews of the passing of Peter Pugh.

A great many societies in the ABPS will have enjoyed a visited from Peter with one of his many Hong Kong related displays, whether it was Treaty Ports, Security marks, Hong Kong or in recent years his evergrowing display of mails from Hong Kong & the Treaty Ports via the Trans-Siberian Railway which started as one display and finished as six. It would be an understatement to say that Peter enjoyed giving displays as it had become his passion since small beginnings in the early 1980s to encompass a wide range of societies throughout England as well as a few in Scotland.



He began his long-standing membership of

Rugby Philatelic Society in 1975 and was twice chairman, from 1981 to 1994 and again from 2017 until his untimely death. Alongside his commitment to his local society he was one of the longest-serving members of the Hong Kong Study Circle which he joined in the mid-1970s. This involved his using his interest in security markings to publish a listing with Philippe Orsetti (USA) which became the basis for a website listing them. In recent years he was also a member of the South Midlands Philatelic society which he supported wholeheartedly.

It would have been a matter of personal pride and satisfaction to him that, despite his diagnosis of MND and the restrictions this put on him, he had chaired the meeting of the Rugby Society the week of his death and had displayed to them only two weeks previously, ably assisted by his wife Rosemary. Such was his determination to fight his illness that he had plans to visit societies in his diary for the rest of this season.

Peter has spent most of his working life as a baker, predominantly in the family business based in Rugby and following his father's retirement with a local supermarket. When he retired, he devoted hours to his philatelic interests and research, meticulously writing up his collections for display whilst also spending time with his family.

Philately has lost a passionate and knowledgeable ambassador who matched his desire to build his collection with sharing it with others and an enthusiasm to grow his local society.

All our thoughts are with his family at this sad time.

#### Michael R Thompson

The National Philatelic Society has been saddened by the news that Michael R Thompson, its immediate past president and former auctioneer, passed away on Tuesday 16<sup>th</sup> September 2023.

Michael became the society's auctioneer 1997, running its monthly auctions for over twenty years. For a decade from 2012, he combined this with the role of president. Many NPS members will recall enjoying his president's displays of *Lundy Island, Classic Ceylon* and *Philatelic Congresses* - three of his main interests. With his drive, determination and thirst for hard work, the society owes a great deal to Michael and it was indeed unfortunate that the end of his term of office coincided with the Covid pandemic and the onset of illness. Outside his NPS activities, Michael played an important role in the Kent philatelic scene and the London & Provincial Stamp Club, and was also involved in Stamp Active where he conducted the children's stamp auctions at Stampex for many years. A fuller obituary and tributes appeared in the December edition of *Stamp Lover*. His funeral took place at noon on Friday 17<sup>th</sup> November at Thames View Crematorium, Gravesend, followed by a wake at the Civic Centre, Gravesend.

#### **Society anniversaries**

According to the date of foundation shown in the societies' information on our records, significant anniversaries include those shown below (though several societies have not let us known their foundation date, so there may be more). Heartiest congratulations to all involved in these milestones:

#### **Yeovil Philatelic Society - 70 Years**

The society will be celebrating its seventieth anniversary in March 2024. It is still active with twenty-five members and nine dealer members. It is therefore one of the largest societies in the Somerset and Dorset Federation. Meetings take place monthly in Yeovil from September to June. Members have a wide range of collecting interests, and have put on a varied programme each year which includes talks on a wide variety of philatelic interests with speakers from within the society and from around the region. For example, subjects covered recently include Australia, North Borneo, the German Occupation of the Channel Islands and Austrian Classics. A talk on Helicopters on stamps was very appropriate in Yeovil! Other activities include regular auctions and displays. Competitions take place although these are not as well supported as in the past. An Annual Stamp Fair is also arranged by the society every October which has attracted up to ten dealers and latterly has included postcards.

We have always taken an active part in firstly the Wessex Federation and subsequently, on its formation in 1972, in the Somerset and Dorset Federation with members holding various offices. Over the years, there have also been a few active members at national level; latterly one has been Chairman of the Austrian Philatelic Society of Great Britain.

New members are always welcome, especially if they are moving to the area and have been members elsewhere.

#### **Swindon Philatelic Society - 80 years**

The society was founded on 10<sup>th</sup> December 1943 in the middle of WWII and with the meeting being interrupted by an air raid. Eighty years on 55 members and guests met in the comfortable surroundings of the Swindon Marriot Delta hotel for a day of displays and socialising to mark the event. The society was pleased to welcome representatives from the other members of the Wiltshire and District Philatelic Federation, and of the Federation itself, plus several other local societies. Our many trophies were on display, not only to show the range of serious and not-so-serious competitions run by us, but also to remember past members, each trophy having been donated by a former member.

As many partners of members do not collect, the day's displays were thematic. Our morning display was by Wendy Buckle, a long-term member of the society. The first part of her display was on *Writing Materials Through the Ages*, and the second half on *Medieval Illuminated Manuscripts*. Wendy informed us that the penknife was originally a sharp knife used to trim quill pens by the writers of such manuscripts.

After a buffet lunch our President, **John Wand**, gave a PowerPoint presentation on the society's history and some of its past and present members. This served as an introduction to a small booklet on the society's past and present that was given to attendees as a memento of the occasion; further copies are available on request (*john.o.wand@gmail.com*). During production of the booklet it became apparent how much of the early history had been lost in the mists of time; probably this is not unique to Swindon PS. It was therefore important that the booklet included articles from our longest-serving members which made 'younger' members aware of some of this history. This uncovered the fact that a member in the 1950s and 1960s had been commemorated with a blue plaque.

(albeit not for his philatelic activities), something that is unique amongst our members. The origins of our annual stamp fair, Swinpex, also became apparent; whilst established to help the society out of a financial black hole, it is now a significant event in the philatelic year and an important contributor to our funds which has helped to finance activities, including the day's event.

Colin Mount followed with A Pig in the Post, a very well-informed display which covered, amongst many other things, the origins of 'piggy bank'; a bank loan to farmers in anticipation of the sale of their pigs at market. The event was concluded with the chance to eat some of the cake made by Carol Gibbon, depicting stamps from each decade of the

#### Nottinghamshire Philatelic Society – 110 Years

On 17<sup>th</sup> November 2023, we celebrated our 110<sup>th</sup> anniversary - actually a week late, as the inaugural date fell between two meetings. The inaugural meeting took place on 10<sup>th</sup> November 1913 at the Victoria Station Hotel. The society has run more or less continuously since then but not without some disruption and reduced programme during the two World Wars when a number of our members were away on active service.

At the inaugural meeting there was an attendance of 55 persons; 110 years on, there were 17 members, but that was quite acceptable for these days now that some people are no longer fit enough to attend meetings. It is in direct contrast, however, to our 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary event which was held at the Mechanics' Institute in Nottingham on 5<sup>th</sup> November 1988. This had philatelic displays to view and was open to the public and other philatelic societies. Over 150 people including our own members turned up.

At the first general meeting on 6<sup>th</sup> December 1913, as was reported in the Nottingham Guardian, one of the exhibits was an Assyrian letter impressed in clay and dated 2000 BC. Even in those days, the bar was set high! Also at that meeting, the subscription for the 1914 season was set at 5/-.

At our 2023 celebration, we were also treated to a fine, possibly unique, display by a fellow member on the postal history of an English market town. At half-time, we enjoyed party food before reassembling for the second part, which was just as interesting and informative as the first.

# Stamp collecting, the Right to Roam, the West Highland Way and Yul Brynner.

Stamp collecting is often seen as a lonely, indoor occupation but here in Scotland one stamp dealer, very well-known to generations of collectors, played a very important part in opening up our great outdoors to ordinary people from all around the world.

BBC Radio4 recently ran a programme about a group called the Hutters at Carbeth, a rural spot just north of Glasgow and base for one of the early outdoor rambling movements. A founder was a very interesting man, William Ferris, OBE.

William Ferris was known to all Glasgow stamp collectors as the owner of the Glasgow Stamp Shop in Cowcaddens. His philatelic sales however did not go into a collection of his own but mainly into supporting his many interests in the Scottish outdoors - rambling, youth hostels, free camping, rights of way.

William Ferris was born In Govan on the south side of Glasgow in 1894. Govan was a very working class centre of shipbuilding and suffered from very poor living conditions in a heavily industrialised area. His son says that only William and a sister, Mary, survived out of eight children. William worked after school each day. His school days over he got a job in one of Glasgow's many theatres, the Pavilion, where he was involved with world-renowned stars such as Houdini and Harry Lauder.

Ferris served through the First World War and after demobilisation he wrote to the landowner of Carbeth estate, Allan Barns-Graham, seeking permission to build a camping hut. The landlord had been supportive of the Clarion Movement which promoted "the clarion call of socialism" and had allowed the Clarion Cyclists to camp on his land. Ferris was allowed to camp, but quite quickly the camp became a hut.

At the same time Ferris started a small business in Glasgow selling antiquarian books and fine art at 157/159 West Nile Street. In a few years this became The Glasgow Stamp Shop, which was the major source of funding for his various voluntary efforts relating to the outdoors. His son says that the stamp side of the business started in the 1920's "when a salesman for Stanley Gibbons, Willie Pragnell, came into the shop and offered an envelope of stamps to be displayed on an antique plate in the window and sold with the plate". Soon stamps took over the whole shop and the books and paintings had to move to other nearby premises.

Most collectors in central Scotland still remember the shop and its unusual triangular extension (two streets met at the junction) where stamps from around

the world were on display. It opened the joy of collecting to many young enthusiasts and attracted some famous names including Yul Brynner, who was in Glasgow to open his latest film. He was quoted in the local paper talking about his stamps "I love collecting them. It's a hobby you start quite innocently, and then you find you're stuck with it." Possibly a sentiment that many of us share. Along with his involvement with the hutting movement, William Ferris was also vice-president of the Camping Club of Great



Britain and Ireland, vice-chairman of the Scottish Council of Physical Recreation, Chairman of the Scottish Rights of Way Society and the Scottish Ramblers' Federation, and a member of the Scottish Tourist Board. He is also credited with helping to establish youth hostels in Scotland. An interesting and more detailed description of his life and activities can be found on the website:

In 2020 a well-known journalist, Lesley Riddoch, issued a book called "Huts - a place beyond", which also recognised the role of William Ferris in opening up the countryside to everyone. She notes how Nordic countries have around 400 000 summer houses or huts, whilst Scotland had 630 at the time of publication. An initiative called Reforesting Scotland Thousand Huts campaign aims to improve that number and let folk discover the Nordic notion of "friluftsliv", an idea of Henrik Ibsen, where recreation, rejuvenation and restoring life balance are found through being in nature.

A grandson now owns and runs Mapes of Millport, a very well-known bicycle-hire business on the holiday island of Cumbrae. On the premises he stores the original signage of the Glasgow Stamp Shop owned by his grandfather. So if you visit, call in and see this bit of philatelic heritage! And remember, if you roam the Scottish hills freely, it might all be down to collectors such as us sitting at home collecting stamps... Russ Walker

The American Stamp Club of Great Britain recently produced issue 250 of its journal *The Mayflower*. The editor, **John Edwards**, decided to hold a competition open to all members. The subject was "*What I Collect and Why*" in a maximum of 300 words. The winning entry was by **Tim Usher**. It is reprinted below by permission of John and Tim.

#### What I Collect and Why

I was tennis coaching in America in 1969 after finishing my studies. One day I visited a small town in the Catskill Mountains and on walking down the main street, I espied in a general store a small display of mint Civil War patriotic covers. Up until that time I had collected USA stamps as my father had a friend living in Hartford, Connecticut, who regularly sent me 1st day covers. On hearing from the store proprietor the history behind these covers. I instantly became intrigued especially being a newly qualified History teacher. I then began to seriously seek out covers which mocked the antics of the Confederates or which promoted the patriotism of the Union. I progressed to used covers, particularly those that contained letters sent by soldiers to their families, detailing their camp life or a request for news from home. Boredom and sickness featured highly in many letters. On one occasion I was fortunate enough to acquire four covers that gave very interesting details of battles fought such as at Bull Run and Gettysburg. I invariably admired the beautiful handwriting displayed in these letters, even those which had been written by men who were hardly literate. Many of my covers in my collection are tatty and stained, having been in the pockets of soldiers marching to the next battlefield. However, their appeal is

enduring as is the thought that these covers are a testament to a bloody period in American history. As a teacher, I have used many of my collection in the teaching of my subject. My pupils are always fascinated by the details that are revealed to them.

#### **Decline in Competition Entries at Local Level**

1. There is little interest in returning to former glories. SDPS has eight cups to be awarded for various categories. Twenty years ago there would be several entries for each category, now many categories have no entries.

#### 2. Reasons why:

- a Too complicated and obscure rules.
- b Unlikely to win as serious philatelists in the society.
- c A nuisance to break up a collection and rewrite for competition criteria.
- d Not competitive.
- e No feedback as to how to improve entries
- f I enter because I enjoy competing. Those that do enter see how valuable it can be to add a story to a straightforward collecting theme. Taking items and developing them into a nine or sixteen sheet entry is felt to be rewarding. They produce entries of a very high standard.

#### 3. Comments on above:

- (2a) As secretary this year I will be sending out the rules and publicising the event. This may improve entries.
- (2b) As it is the entry point for the federation, this is unlikely to change. It is a slightly hollow reason as we have a category for novices and we now get no entries.
- (2c) Difficult to change. A suggestion was that it might be easier if entries could be just scans.
- (2e) A chicken and egg problem. When we had a decent number of entries we had a judge. Now with so few entries a judge would have very little to judge and it would be a waste of his time. Sending scans to a judge might overcome this and also make it easier to prepare an entry.

He soon found that he enjoyed swapping / trading stamps as much as collecting them. Aged 19, eschewing University he quickly found a philatelic career in London, leading to creating his own companies in stamps. Andrew has authored many internationally published Stamp 'Tips' articles, appearing on Local Radio and National TV promoting Philately with Alan Titchmarsh. Andrew's area of expertise is unusual - in so far as his grounding in collecting and wide philatelic knowledge has given him a deep understanding of Philately. He has studied Philately for the past 51 years, in combination with Commerce and Marketing Expertise, enabling him to create synergies in 'lifetime' interlinked Stamp Selling Systems, selling unit-priced stamps through to handling collections & Rarities up to £700,000 each. Today Andrew is fortunate to be co-owner with his Wife, of Universal Philatelic Auctions (aka UPA) - the Largest No Buyer's Premium Reducing-Estimate System Stamp Auction in the World, creating records selling stamps to 2.261 different bidders

from 54 different countries in his international auctions.
Andrew stopped collecting stamps aged 18 reasoning that his enjoyment of stamps would be in handling them and soling them... He loves working in stamps Three years later, attending my first public stamp auctions I wondered how some bidders seemed to buy everything, paying the highest price? It didn't occur to me that they were probably Auction Bidding Agents, paid by absent (dealer) bidders to represent them. I wondered why two collectors sitting side by side muttered to each other "he's a dealer" as if that justified him paying the highest price...

...but did it really? What was the real reason? How could a Dealer pay a higher price than a Collector? It doesn't make sense, does it? Collectors are customers. Customers usually pay the highest price, unless... for a Collector, this was...

Wrong Presentation Wrong Place X
therefore Wrong Price X

**3** Fast-forward 48 years later to a British Empire collection, lot #1 in an International Stamp Auction – Estimated at £3,000, but we were the highest bidder at £21,000 – YES – some 7×higher. Including Buyer's Premium in the extraordinary sum of £4,788 we actually paid GBP£25,788= upon a £3,000 estimate... however, we broke it down into sets, singles, minicollections etc. We made a profit. Some might say it found its price. Others may say:

Wrong Estimate X Wrong Presentation X
Wrong StructureX Wrong Protection of Price X

– Lucky for the seller that 2 well-heeled bidders saw the potential value that day or it could have been given away... the seller could easily have lost out couldn't he? or she?

So, by un-peeling the layers of obfuscation, hopefully we can all agree:

The Secret is Simple –
it's ALL ABOUT: TIMING
Plus the 3 Philatelic 'P's –

Presentation Place and Price

4 Understanding the problem... always remember the car trade had their own little 'bible' - Glass's Guide. I've no idea, I've not even looked - in this internet-dominated world, it may even have disappeared. Well, there's an insider Stamp Trade publication for Stamp Dealers called "The Philatelic Exporter". There's nothing that special about it - and you won't learn much or find massively reduced prices by subscribing - BUT - it is a forum, a paper focal point, a last 'bastion' in this on-line transparent world that we inhabit... whereby dealers (and auctioneers) can try and communicate with each other. I publish my own articles there...

Recently I discussed the outcome of my 10 years' simple research, asking dealers and auctioneers 'what is your biggest problem?'

To a man, (why are we almost all men), they replied — "my biggest problem is stock, if I can get more of the right stock I can sell it easily"

Strange that, nobody ever asked me the same question back – because my answer would have been entirely different (and I don't treat it as a problem) – I seek to satisfy more collector clients than any other stamp auction

This is the reason why my company has such massive advertising. This is the reason why we spend up to 8% of turnover – up to £200,000 per annum in marketing costs. (Most dealers don't even sell £200K per annum).

5 Why is that? Because, as the world revolved the Stamp Market, imperceptibly Changed, and incrementally -Massively

So, although few will tell you this, it's clearly evident that the problem for most Sellers of Stamps today is no longer absent stock – but absent collectors in

the place they choose to sell their stamps in. Simply put, other Dealers, Auctions, Stamp Fairs have not invested in marketing to have a strong Customer-core. To be fair, this is not true of all - but it is true of most - so that our former competitor 'Apex' had 800 bidders in a recent auction. obvious so that money may be taken, almost surreptitiously, in numerous different ways, (without us apparently noticing until we see the cheque in our pocket) - the transparent 'seller pays' has been deliberately 'obscured' - so much so that, amazingly, the latest 2017 European Auction Selling Legislation just introduced - now requires auctions that charge 'buyer's premiums' to warn the buyer in advance. Just imagine going into the petrol station, and being warned that the price you're paying to put fuel in you tank is not the real price, you have to pay a premium! Obviously, there would be an uproar...

9 How can you cut out the middleman and sell Collectors instead? Well, I can think of two ways. 1). DIY - Do It Yourself selling on eBay. That may be fine for lower grade material - but, would you risk auctioning relatively unprotected rare material on eBay ? We don't and we're professionals, so we should know what we're doing. Or 2). 

# A Collecting Tangent – The Azemar Experimental Cancellation



As fellow collectors I'm sure the concept of collecting tangents is familiar. The core collection gaps narrow, you see something different that piques your interest or you simply

want to diversify. So, off you go into a new collecting rabbit hole.

For me, one of those long-standing tangents has been the Azemar Experimental Cancellation. More on that topic in a moment. My main collection is focused on Great Britain postal history (another tangent!) and stamps from Queen Victoria through to King George VI. I collect to the Concise Stanley Gibbons catalogue listing. It was in the pursuit of that goal that took me to one of the annual Stampex Philatelic Shows many years back. The iconic dealer, Bill Barrell, introduced something he felt would be of interest to me, a small display of the Azemar Experimental Cancellation from the former Pinkus Collection. That was it, the tangent was created.

Since that time, I have come to really appreciate what was one of the first serious attempts at introducing a mechanical postmark machine rather than relying on the traditional hand-stamped postmarks.

The name 'Azemar' is actually rather incorrect to quite a few people. Mr J C Azemar, of London, was only the sales representative of the German machine, invented by Carl Fischer and JCW Mass. The machine itself was manufactured in Germany by Robert Hinrichsen following a patent being granted in 1867. Some do refer to it as the Hinrichsen machine.

The mark consisted of two parts, a small circular date frank indicating day, month and year of postage, together with a postage stamp obliterator, to ensure that used stamps could not be re-used.

Most articles on the Azemar Experimental Cancellation suggest there were three trials of the machine;

First Trial – 31<sup>st</sup> March 1869 to 24<sup>th</sup> June 1869 Second Trial – 17<sup>th</sup> May 1871 to December 1871 Third Trial – 17<sup>th</sup> May 1872 to 8<sup>th</sup> November 1872

However, there is some excellent research by Tim Schofield (presented to the Great Britain Philatelic Society in 2006) suggesting the machine was used in England for a short time in 1868.

Ultimately, all three trials were deemed unsuccessful, with the machine not effectively postmarking 10% or more of the mail which



passed through it, and it required a high level of maintenance!

Although the Azemar Experimental Cancellation is not rare, there are certain stamps upon which it is rarer, and indeed difficult, to locate. The most common source is the SG 43 1d Rose-Red, or Penny Red. The more

difficult line-engraved stamps to find the Azemar postmark on are the 2d Blue, ½d Rose-Red (exceptionally scarce) and 1½d Rose-Red/Lake-Red (l've yet to find one!). On surface printed stamps, the mark is also

particularly scarce.

Recently, to bring things full circle, I was in discussion with Bill Barrell who has encouraged me to take a leap into the philatelic display territory with my Azemar collection. I will keep you posted on that development!

#### **Bridlington & District**


We opened the programme for 2023 with our two society competitions of 12-16 sheets which were judged by members present. The winning entry for the John Eaton Memorial Trophy was a display of *Spanish Franco Heads*, whilst the Peter Pearson Postcard Cup was won by a selection of *Postcards made in different types of material*. In early June The North Star Hotel in Flamborough was the venue for the annual dinner that we were able to subsidise from our

healthy funds. The visit from **Mike Kentzer** with his display of *Scarborough*, *Whitby and the Railway inbetween* attracted a record attendance. The evening was of interest to local historians as well as philatelists and we welcomed members from the Scarborough and Hull societies. Recalling his early days living in Scarborough he took us on a tour of the resort with his vintage postcards together with postal history items, and the second half covered aspects of the railway between Scarborough and Whitby. For the final meeting before our winter break members were invited to present material on a theme entitled Mv Favourite Things. Eric Lienhard, Tor Torkildsen, Paul Green, Nick Harris, Chris Norton, John Rawlins, John Copeland and Pat Adams rose to the occasion with a range of items including Swiss Postcards, Stamps from Victoria's Empire, Norwegian Charity Christmas Seals, GVI "Sea Horses", Illustrated Covers for Boer War Post by A Lyons, Mail by Boat to Ports on the Chinese Mainland to be transported on the Trans-Siberian Railway and Local Historic Postcards.

#### **Chichester & District**

We were very privileged to host **Peter Davidson**, Portsmouth PS's secretary, in late October. His presentation, entitled The Evolution of Steam, was an education in rail gauges, curves, iron used in rail construction and locomotive history. Who wouldn't be intriqued by the history of Richard Trevithick who in 1801 began construction of a stationary steam boiler? He continued with his inventions and in 1804 he invented the world's first steam locomotive for the Merthyr Tramroad in South Wales. In four hours and five minutes it travelled 15.69 km (9.75 mi) with a speed of 5 mph! In 1811 John Blenkinsopp patented a design for a locomotive for the Middleton Railway. Other inventors and engineers were mentioned, but the father and son team known to most schoolchildren was George and Robert Stephenson who in 1813 built the 'Puffing Billy', followed in 1814 by 'Blucher'. As Peter guoted, "Things were getting bigger and better". His presentation was backed up with numerous picture postcards, special commemorative covers with fancy cancellations and intricate cachets, and stamps from Great Britain, Nevis, Funafuti-Tuvalu, Guyana, Nevis and more, His second half included discussion about steam locomotion and engines through to the 1960s. #### Croydon

At our November meeting **James Podger** showed material related to *Welsh Postal History*. James began collecting this in 2017 and has quickly acquired a

From 1840 there were a few letters with Penny Red stamps, Finally, James showed several envelopes with Penny Black stamps. Most of the mail was internal to the UK but there were covers of overseas mail, for example from the West Indies. Our last 2023 meeting was for members' displays. Richard West showed Abu Dhabi, Brian Asquith brought Chinese Airmail the British Connection, Chris Board had Union of South Africa. Peter Wood displayed Christmas in Ireland and Mike Hewit showed Stamp

Collection, started at the age of 9 with the gift of his first album from his older sister. The second half was the Christmas Social with a wonderful selection of food arranged by president **Pauline McBroom**. He gave an outline of the history of revenue fees and explained how the destruction (in error) of revenue stamps resulted in very few now existing. 
#### **Epping Forest & District**

throughout the 1930s, ending with Chancellor Dollfuss and the Fatherland Front. Hitler had aspirations to assimilate Austria, the country of his birth, and following the Chancellor's assassination and replacement by Kurt von Schuschnigg, peace attempts failed. On 12<sup>th</sup> March 1936, the Germans simply 'walked' into Vienna unopposed, welcomed by cheering crowds. Hitler launched a campaign to annex Austria, calling for a referendum to legitimise his decision. Among other organisations, the post offices of Germany and Austria were instrumental in presenting propaganda to encourage people to vote: a special cancel "On 10<sup>th</sup> April say 'yes' for your Fuhrer" was one such. Propaganda cards and other items were produced. Special election-day stamps, postal stationery and cancellations also appeared. The result of the Anschluss referendum was a resounding 'Yes' and postcards were issued celebrating victory. With Austria becoming a German province known as the Ostmark, all national events and festivities were commemorated with special postmarks and postcards, culminating with "The First People's Christmas in the Ostmark". 


### King's Lynn

The last two Zoom presentations of 2023 enjoyed by attendees were Paris Pneumatic Post by Andy Soutar and Apollo Moon Landing by Barry Feltham. philatelists' philatelic society commission, has four Large Gold medals, and recently returned from Essen in Germany, having presented at the seminar: Current Trends in Postal Stationery'. #### The Czechoslovak PS of GB

Fifteen members gathered at The George in London on 4<sup>th</sup> November 2023 to judge entries for the **Kay Goodman Trophy** – the winner was **Roger Morrell** with *Parcel Post During Empire Times* – and to enjoy **Yvonne Wheatley**'s

presentation on *The History of Czechoslovakia Told Through the Postal System*. Yvonne began by focusing on the three founders of the new Republic: Masaryk, Beneš, and Štefánik. A national anthem was needed – celebrated in 1934 with a set of stamps and much-sought-after miniature sheets. In carving up the Austro-Hungarian Empire to create Czechoslovakia, other countries lost territory. Poland led the complaints, leading to the Seven Days' War in Silesia. A wealth of material illustrated the Sudetenland crisis, including a set of stamps prepared but never issued. The

but never issued. The independence of Carpatho-Ukraine lasted 24 hours – just enough time to issue an overprinted stamp! The story of Theresienstadt was included, with a display of parcel permit stamps and related postal history: letters in and out of Theresienstadt, ration stamps, and a repatriation certificate for a survivor. Stamps illustrated those involved in Heydrich's assassination, Lidice (with before and after photographs), and Nicholas



Winton. Yvonne reminded members that the late **Robert Kingsley**, a member of the society, was one of the children rescued by Winton. Stamps and postal history also illustrated the communist party postwar takeover, currency devaluation in 1953, the Prague Spring in 1968, the Velvet Revolution in 1989, and finally the dissolution of the country in 1993.

#### **Great Britain**

Our March meeting at the Royal PS in Abchurch Lane, London will include a display from Michael Sefi LVO RDP FRPSL entitled A Mixed Display Featuring GB Material from 1900 to 1936. The display will focus on the Profile Head one penny definitive stamps of GV through to 1936. Michael has spent some years studying the Transatlantic Post Office, which operated between the United Kingdom and New York from 1905 to 1914, involving operating post offices providing some services to passengers and crew on board ships exclusively of the White Star and American Lines. The afternoon session will focus on the Annual Competitions and will consist of a Zoom-based PowerPoint critique of entries, presented by the judges. There will then be the opportunity, for those present in-person at the meeting, to view all the entries in full, and for those entering to ask further questions of the judges regarding their entries. The next meeting will also be held at the Royal. Bob Galland will present an overview of The Penny Lilac Postage and Revenue Stamp as a prelude to members' displays in the afternoon. Throughout its 20-year or so lifespan more than 33 000 million stamps were produced. Two versions of the stamp are known: Dies I (14 dots) and I I (16 dots). However, other differences are apparent such as the shape and alignment of some of the letters in the legend. The Penny Lilac would have been an easily recognisable feature of Victorian life. A second part was on the travails of the background of the *Early 1884 -1891 Johor/Johore overprints*. **Nick Hervey** showed the *Provisional Issue of 1867* and a selection of *Bangkok B overprints* and many *Surcharges of North Borneo*. **Dominic Morris** showed many varieties of the *Trengganu Red Cross*

Overprints and Varieties. Roger Barry gave a superb display of Overprints of Sungei Ujong. Len Stanley showed examples of some 1981 Singapore surcharges and discussed the curiosity of how some first day covers occurred. Peter Cockburn followed with some very rare North Borneo 19th surcharges. On 18th November in a Zoom meeting Henry Ong from Singapore showed Postal Stationery of the Federation of Malaya 1948-1957 - Postal Cards, comprising Johore, Kedah, Kelantan, Malacca, Negri Sembilan, Pahang, Penang, Perak, Perlis, Selangor and Trengannu. In December was Members' Displays Q to T. Michael Waugh showed Queen Victoria, Stamps, Stationery, Covers of Straits Settlements with surcharges. Peter Cockburn brought Queen Victoria North Borneo covers. Susan McEwen showed Straits Settlements Newspaper cuttings at the end of WWII, Nick Hervey showed early Sarawak stamps and Andrew Norris showed rare examples of the \$5 Malaya-Borneo Exhibition of 1922.

Members at the London meeting in September were treated to a superb thematic display by **Brian Sole FRPSL** on the subject of *Cycling*, while the online meeting in October featured colourful *Issues of Labuan and North Borneo* presented by **Dr Higgins FRPSL**. 
Eighteen Group members presented a total of 30 displays ranging from early mail through to a look at the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary set of stamps issued on 7<sup>th</sup> September 2020. The November display by **Howard Hughes FRPSL** was entitled *The Maltese Cross*. The display won the Grand Prix National when shown at the London 2022 International Stamp Exhibition. It explains how the obliterator was used – including the need to change the ink composition and design of the obliterator – and why and when it was replaced, including examples of late usage. *Aspects of Great Britain Postal History before 1840* was the title of the display given by **Peter Chadwick** 

**FRPSL** in late November. What was on show was an incredible array of material from the Bishop Marks up to the introduction of Uniform Fourpenny Post in December 1839. Peter revealed that he had been a collector for 77 years, having decided in 2006 to concentrate solely on postal history. The superlatives were fully justified when **Richard Berry FRPSL** presented an incredible collection, immaculately written up, of *Classic Afghanistan* in December. Camellia Plc owns the collection which covers the First Afghan War of 1839 to 1842, the classic stamps of Afghanistan, and the Second Afghan War of 1878 to 1880

to have received other than the 2nd Class stamp and personally I consider these to be some of the best for 2023 - old-fashioned perhaps but











with good cancellations, others with the more common black marker pen or biro lines. It is

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

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












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
